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# **Torah Study - Let's Talk**

Message from Rabbi Mike Lotker

Many of you have been kind enough to share your impressions and feedback concerning our High Holy Days services. The Board and I have been compiling these thoughts and will use what you've told us to try to make services better and better each year. One of the most gratifying impressions that I've heard, however, is how much so many

of you enjoyed the Yom Kippur afternoon discussion. I confess (as appropriate concerning Yom Kippur) that this is also one of the highlights of my High Holy Days experience.

My sense is that many of us enjoy the discussion because of the ability to talk about what

really bothers us and really delights us about Judaism, God, religion, services and even life. There is no need to have a great store of knowledge or information; what is valued and valuable is our opinions, our experience and our ability to share and to listen. Since there is no specific agenda or curriculum that we must cover, there is no rush and it is a delight to digress into areas that interest us. I've been attending and leading these kinds of discussions for more that 20 years and I never fail to come away invigorated and enlightened.

For those of you that enjoy these kinds of discussions, I've got wonderful news: We have three such sessions each week and you may not have realized it! The sessions are:

- 1. Torah Study the Women's Perspective: led by our Student Rabbi Lisa Bock on Wednesday from 12 noon to 1:30PM.
- 2. Lunch n Learn: Discussion group led by Rabbi Mike, Thursday 12:30 to 2PM.

3. Shabbat Morning Torah Study: Led by Student Rabbi Lisa and Rabbi Mike Saturday mornings 9:30 to 11AM.

I have a strong suspicion that many of you do not attend these "Torah Study" sessions because you are under the misunderstanding that you need to know Hebrew, be very familiar with the Torah and Bible, or because

you think the sessions will be long winded, dry, expositions of boring (or at least tedious) material. Nothing could be further from the truth!

The discussions are conducted using the Torah (or other text) as a starting point but focusing on issues and questions that concern

us all. You don't need to be an expert because we have wonderful texts and commentaries available to us. You don't have to come every week although we hope you will make it part of your regular spiritual discipline. And you never know who you will see or meet – it was at Torah Study that I first met my lovely Sonia who is now my wife and your *Rebbitzin*.

When we pray, we speak to God. When we gather for this kind of study, God speaks to us. *Shema Yisrael!* Listen up, Israel! So, try it! You'll like it!

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


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# **Executive Leadership Team Message**

# CHEDER CHAPPENINGS

Shalom Haverim,

Last month I introduced you to our wonderful faculty. This month we will be looking at a very important part of our Torah

School curriculum: Hebrew reading and our program for prayer instruction. Most of our Hebrew curricular material and textbooks come from Behrman House Publishers (Springfield, New Jersey). I strongly encourage families and all congregants to go to their website at

www.behrmanhouse.com. They have a lot of free, on-line programs to help you with your Alef Bet and learning your prayers.

# Hebrew Language

From the youngest age our students are introduced to Hebrew words and expressions. Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students learn numbers, colors, names of animals (the Noah story is perfect!) and other vocabulary related to holidays and key Jewish concepts. As the children move up through the grades additional vocabulary is introduced

(relating to prayer, holidays and Jewish values) along with some basic Hebrew grammar.

Although the focus of our program is not on conversational skills, we are so fortunate at Ner Ami to have several teachers who speak Hebrew—that it is a natural occurrence to imbed the language in our instruction.

# Hebrew Reading

Beginning Hebrew readers start with Shalom Alef Bet, which introduces the Hebrew letters and vowels, demonstrates that Hebrew is read from right to left and offers a basic vocabulary. Pictures link letters to words, i.e. shofar for *shin*, Torah for *tav*.

Shalom Uvracha is our primer. It teaches decoding skills using key cultural words, prayers and concepts. For example, students learn the letters *kuf* and *tzadee* from the word *tzedakah*. They learn to read Hebrew with words they will come across again in their prayer study. We use an interactive, computer program which provides Hebrew exercises in a fun, video game format that students can also do at home.

# Hebrew through Prayer

<u>Hineni</u> is our primary program for the teaching of prayer-based Hebrew. Separate booklets for specific prayers allows us to individualize instruction and for students to work at their own pace. <u>Hineni</u> teaches students to translate key prayer words, identify important roots, suffixes and prefixes, explain the theme of each prayer and connect prayer to its underlying Jewish value. We have a computer lab

where students can work independently using the interactive CD's.

# B'nai Mitzvah Tutoring

As our students reach Bar and Bat Mitzvah age they begin individual sessions with our Student Rabbi to work on their Torah and Haftorah portions. Our students learn to read trope (melody) and move from reading their Parsha (Torah portion) with vowels to reading it directly from the Torah scroll without vowels.

# T'filah (Prayer in the Sanctuary)

One of the most important aspects of our Torah School curriculum is the practical application of what students are learning in the classroom. In our weekly T'filah, students learn to transfer their Hebrew reading to the Siddur (prayer book). Our short-term goal is the preparation for Bar and Bat Mitzvah. These weekly T'filah sessions are lead by our Cantor and upcoming B'nai Mitzvah students. More importantly, our long-term goal is that all of our students will be comfortable in attending and participating in any prayer service—wherever they go throughout their lifetimes.

#### Adult Education - Alef Bet & Prayer

This year we have offered a class for adults in Hebrew reading and in learning the Shabbat prayers. The class meets during our regular school hours and is taught by Torah School teachers. Adult students join the rest of the "kids" for T'filah.

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# SACRED STORIES OF HOLY OBJECTS

"The Old Tallit" by Kaila Kaden

The neatly dressed old man sat alone, quietly waiting for the morning Yom Kippur services to begin. Also waiting, I glanced around to survey the congregation when I saw him

sitting at the end of the row directly behind me. He

wore the usual attire for a man of his age on Yom Kippur, a brown suit with a modestly printed floral tie, tallit wrapped around his shoulders. That tallit, obviously very old, radiated something that I simply could not look away from, and the man was radiant for wearing it. I was curious so I struck up a conversation with him in order to learn more. "L'Shana Tovah," I said to him with a smile. "L'Shana Tovah," he answered, looking at me inquisitively. I told him how special his Tallit looked to me and asked him if he would kindly tell

me about it. He smiled broadly - I could see how my question delighted him - and he told me his story.

As a young boy in Poland this man spent every Shabbat and Holiday going to the synagogue with his beloved Grandfather. That tallit had wrapped his Grandfather and he knew every strand and every knot as if it was his own. When he turned 13 and read from the Torah himself for the first time, his Grandfather beamed with pride as he gave this man that tallit. The man went on to tell me that he had another, more modern and more ornate tallit, but this special one was the only one he wore for the High Holy Days because whenever he wore it, he could feel his Grandfather at his side, just like he was on that day so long ago in that tiny Polish village. It wasn't the most ornate tallit in the synagogue that day, but as the service began and I turned around to open my prayer book, it struck me

that this tallit was perhaps one of the most special in the room. That tallit and its legacy had connected me - through the nice old man in the brown suit - to a family in a little Polish village, nearly 100 years ago. At that moment, I realized that we really are all connected. *L'Dor Va Dor* was right there behind me on Yom Kippur morning. All of this got me thinking about the


many stories of *Klei Kodesh* - Sacred Objects - that surely reside in each of our homes and hearts.

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# How do you prepare for the holidays? A lesson from Jacob and his brother Esau.

My, how time flies! It seems I was just writing about the beginning of the school year, and now we are looking towards Thanksgiving and Chanukah. We have our Jewish calendar merging with our Gregorian calendar, and so this year, our Jewish holidays are early.

The Jewish month of Cheshvan usually coincides with the month of November. This year the last week of Cheshvan overlaps with the first week of November. The first full day of Chanukah will be on December 2<sup>nd</sup>, so we light our first

candle on Wednesday evening December 1st. So we'll have Thanksgiving the last Thursday in November, and Chanukah will be just under a week later.

So we have a lot to prepare for! Cheshvan in the Jewish calendar is the only month that does not have a Jewish holiday. Yes – there is Shabbat each week – and indeed, that is our weekly gift of Sabbath rest and peace, which we can think of as a holiday, certainly a Holy day. But no festivals, no special celebrations. Perhaps this is a kind of resting period after the High Holy Days, and Sukkot.

So how do you prepare for all the holidays – both secular and religious – that come at the end of November and December?

I think that the cooking and gift buying should be an obvious answer, so what I'm really asking is, how do you prepare yourself?

Just this morning, a friend said to me, "I'm looking forward to the holidays." "Really", I said, "So soon?" "Yes, but not the shopping and the craziness...I'm looking forward to the special time with my family – mom, dad, brother, nieces and nephews..."

While many of us genuinely look forward to the holidays, not all of us do. For some of us, it may be a very stressful time, an intense time of personalities, expectations, fears, and even antagonism. Rather than looking forward to holidays, some of us feel more like we're putting on psychic armor and gearing up for battle.

There is a story in the Bible about Jacob and Esau. When their father, Isaac, was dying, Jacob deceived their nearly blind father by impersonating Esau and thus Jacob received Esau's birthright. Esau flies into a rage and swears to kill his brother once the mourning period for their father is over. Jacob flees his brother and his family of birth, and only years later, returns to the lands in which his brother Esau resides. As you can imagine, Jacob is nervous about their meeting again – his brother must still be angry with him, mustn't he? At this point I imagine Jacob donning psychic armor and gearing up for battle with his brother, but seeing how heavy he becomes with this armor, he chooses another path. Indeed, the narrative tells us that next, Jacob prays to God, pours his heart out, and declares himself

unworthy of the bounty in life he has received. That night an angel wrestles with him and neither prevails. As dawn begins to break, the angel tries to leave, but Jacob asks for a blessing. The angel gives Jacob a new name: Israel, meaning to struggle with God. In the morning, Jacob meets up with Esau, and while Jacob is still afraid, Esau greets him with an embrace, and they weep together.

What about this can be helpful to us?

First, there is recognition of past failings. Jacob prays to God and pours his heart out. In the process of praying to God, he does an honest assessment of his self – his past, present, and future, and who he has been in his life. In his wrestling with the angel, he himself changes from Jacob to Israel. When we struggle with something, we ourselves change, the struggle impacts us and when it comes from honesty and truth, it can be transformative.

Second, there is recognition of expectations. It is very clear that Jacob expects the worst in his meeting with Esau. What are our expectations when we meet people with whom we have a history? Jacob

is pleasantly surprised when his brother embraces him, and a happy reunion takes place. If we take a moment ahead of time, and imagine ourselves at a holiday or family event – and look honestly and figure out what our expectations are, whether of good things (is it realistic to expect all good things?), or of bad things (is this realistic as well?), and see if we can just allow ourselves to let those expectations go, and instead see things, events, and people newly – just recognize that we have expectations, and let them go.

Third, people can change, and we ourselves can change. Jacob changes and becomes Israel. We are not told what changes may have taken place in Esau and his personality, but clearly Esau is no longer a man who has sworn to kill his brother. People can change, and most importantly, we ourselves have the capacity to change. Again, recognize that we have expectations, including how we think people really are. If we can let these expectations go, we might get a chance to see who is really there.

Fourth, generosity and appreciation go a long way in mending the past and building a future. Jacob recognizes the change in his brother Esau. Their response to one another is an appreciation of one another's place in life, and a generosity to one another. They greet one another, and Jacob introduces his family, and Jacob gives Esau gifts. Esau offers to travel slowly with them and give Jacob and his family men to help them continue their travels. Generosity and appreciation begins with the willingness to be generous and appreciative.

May you be blessed with a meaningful and loving holiday season, Student Rabbi Lisa Bock

Thank you again to the gracious people who helped with the Onegs during the last three months. They are:




