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What Every Jew Should Know About the Messiah

Message from Rabbi Mike Lotker

It's that time of the year again – Christmas decorations, Christmas giving, Christmas songs and TV programs, you know what I mean. I confess that I do love this time of the year and the very Jewish values that are espoused: loving one's neighbor, charity,

peace on earth and goodwill among people, family getting together and eating! I even love the Christmas decorations and sappy old black and white movies. But it is especially in this season that it is important for every Jew to understand why we don't accept Jesus as Messiah.

Most important to appreciate is that when we Jews speak of Messiah, we mean something completely different than when Christians speak of Messiah. The English word *messiah* comes from the Hebrew mashiach, literally meaning "anointed one." In biblical times, the ascension of kings to their positions was marked not with a crown but with holy oil being poured over their heads, anointing them. When the Hebrew Bible was translated into Greek some 200 years before the time of Jesus, the word mashiach was translated into the Greek word christos, eventually giving us the English word Christ. This is why Jews should never refer to Jesus as "Christ" or "Jesus Christ," because doing so would be giving him the title of messiah.

Very little is written directly about the Messiah in the Hebrew Bible (in fact, the title "the Messiah," as a specific personality, does not appear at all there), although there is considerable discussion in the *Talmud*, *Midrash* and other rabbinic sources. While there is not absolute agreement on the details of the Messiah, virtually all Jewish sources would agree on the following points:


1. The Messiah will be fully human and only

human. He will be born and die in the natural manner expected of any man. He will be a "son of God" in the same way each and every one of us is a "child of God." He will come from the line of King David.

2. He will be a ruler (probably political and possibly military in the model of King David) and an agent of God who will

restore the sovereignty of the Jewish people and usher in the Messianic Age, gathering the Jewish people from exile to the holy land (Isaiah 27:12-13 and Isaiah 11:12).

- 3. The Messianic Age will be a time of peace among all peoples ("they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks," Isaiah 2:4) and even among animals ("the wolf shall dwell with the lamb," Isaiah 11:6). It will be a time when the entire world accepts the one God ("the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord," Isaiah 11:9).
- 4. The Messiah will not be God. Only God is God and "God is One" (Deuteronomy 6:4). For Jews, the concept of God becoming human or taking on human form is foreign. There is no concept of anything resembling the Trinity of Christianity.

5. The Messiah will not be involved in the redemption of sin any more than any human Jewish leader, certainly not by his sacrifice. Only God is described

as "Redeemer" in Judaism. Specifically, the Messiah will not come to redeem original sin since Judaism does not believe in original sin. For Jews, the salvation of the world does not depend on the Messiah but upon people doing the will of God as expressed in God's commandments.

As most of us know, the Christian concept of Jesus as Messiah is quite different.
Jesus is understood by Christians to be
God in an important sense and to be
central to the question of redemption from sin. As I often say, the idea that God would become human and suffer with and for humanity, even sacrificing his life for us, is a moving, beautiful idea. It simply is not a Jewish idea. The key question is not about the nature of Jesus; the key question is about the nature of God.

There is wide disagreement among Jewish thinkers

about the nature of the Messiah when he or she arrives. Some mystics believe that the Messiah will be a miracle worker in the fashion of some of the Hebrew

prophets. Others believe that the Messiah will come only after no longer needed; that is, the Messianic age will be brought into place by ordinary humans working to bring about world peace, to cure disease, hunger, prevent injustice, etc. In this view (which I share) the Messiah's role will be to wish us a hearty "Mazel Tov!" – congratulations for a job long awaited and well done.

My prayer is that we Jews and Christians each live up to our highest religious teachings

and ideals – that Christians inspired by their biblical teachings embrace the true spirit of peace and love this Christmas season (and all seasons) and that we Jews continue to work together, 24/6 (we get Shabbat off), with each other and with people of good will of all faiths to bring about a world that will truly seem like paradise.

Today, *Beth Shalom* is nearing full capacity. There is still time to secure your prearrangement property before the opportunity is gone and before year end cost increases.



The students include: Griffin



of Kristallnacht - the Night of Broken Glass that signaled the beginning of the Holocaust 72 years ago. The students read eye-witness accounts of the events of Kristallnacht along with writings by Elie Wiesel. The program was concluded by a showing of the photographs of the Berlin Synagogue which had been set afire on Kristallnacht but was rebuilt and reopened in 2007.

For their unit of study on the Holocaust, the 7th grade class was fortunate to have two guest speakers, Annelies Regen and Lee Edwards, talking to the students and parents about their personal experiences.



SACRED STORIES OF HOLY OBJECTS

"Chanukah Gelt" by Shlomo Kreitzer



It was not really a surprise, but it was so unusual and so special, that I remember it clearly, more than sixty years later.

When I was a young boy,

our family tradition for Chanukah was this. On the first night, after dinner, we lit our *chanukiyah* (the special, eight-plus-one candelabra) and chanted the *b'rochas* together. That was the only night we sang *Shehechiyanu*, my favorite *b'rocha*.

Then, we had *latkes* for dessert, intermixed with traditional songs -- "I Have a Little Dreydl," "Oh Chanukah, Oh Chanukah," "Mo'az Tzur," and, sometimes, others. Our inviolable family tradition, each year, was arguing: should *latkes* be eaten with sour cream, applesauce or jam (or all of them).

We weren't well off and this was before parents tried to compete, gift-wise, with Christmas. So, this was our **one** big night! Holding off my sisters' and my impatient entreaties as long as they could, my parents would finally bring out our Chanukah gifts, usually something practical, maybe a pen, maybe a shirt, maybe a book and

We got Chanukah *Gelt*. We each got a silver dollar. (At that time, they were really silver. If only I had kept them all!) They were the physically biggest U.S. coin. It was a big deal! The coins were always shiny. They spun really well, and then

made a good noise when they fell on the wood or formica table. This was the only time of the year that I saw these special coins other than in my own treasure box.

For many years I saved my Chanukah *Gelt* in a secret hiding place in a small box, in the back of my underwear drawer. The box was reassuringly

heavy and, somehow, I felt rich. By the time I went away to college, I may have had a dozen such coins.

Now, over the years, my wife, Chana, and I have continued this tradition with our daughter, even offering to match the number of dollars she still had from the previous years, but, fortunately for us, she usually spent her Chanukah silver dollars by then.

Now, with our daughter and our randchildren we have continued to give them so-called silver dollars for Chanukah. It's not easy to get these, the big ones, the "real" ones, any more. Our oldest grandson carries one of his special "Chanukah dollars" from *Bubbe* and *Zeyde* with him in a "hidden" pocket in his wallet as he has for a few years. It's special to him, as he is to us!

I still have a few of the very silver dollars, now blackened, my parents gave me many years ago. These old coins and the ones we give out now, clearly repeat a happy scene of proud parents and delighted children. That's our, now, four generation Jewish family tradition: Chanukah *Gelt*.



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Buenos Aires Cantors' Concert to Benefit Torah School

On Saturday night, January 15th at 7:30PM, we will have two wonderful cantors from Buenos Aires join us for a concert with all net proceeds going to our Torah School. Sonia and I have seen these Cantors lead services in California and Buenos Aires and we attended a concert of theirs some two years ago. They

are talented, funny and entertaining (and married to each other). We adore them!

Cantors Diego Rubinsztein and Alejandra Levi are among the pioneers of Jewish renewal in prayer through music in South America. Rubinsztein is a composer, pianist and recording artist, as well as the cantor of Libertad synagogue, the oldest and most traditional synagogue in Buenos Aires.

Levi works for the Schlichei Tzibur Institute and Libertad synagogue in the Argentine capital, and is also the director of the Zimra Musical Institute. The two cantors have performed throughout the world, from New York and Miami to Brazil, Uruguay and Israel. Their latest CD is "Paths".

Jewish prayer in Argentina has a very particular musical sound and emotion. "We are always trying to create

different spiritual moments," said Rubinsztein. "For that, we use a lot of melodies and styles." Cadences, rhythms and moods utilized by the two singers range from Hasidic melodies, Sephardic tunes and spirituals to lyric-free meditations — all with a Latin flavor. "Our idea about t'fila (prayer) is to always pray in

> community," said Rubinsztein. "That's why in our congregation, we're a lot of cantors, singing and leading the service together."

In our everyday lives, we don't always take advantage of unique moments and opportunities. The religious experience is, sadly, something we often don't mind skipping. But there are moments that shouldn't be missed. On Saturday January 15th, we have a one-of-a-kind opportunity.

Let's embrace it. Come see, hear and be part of an uplifting experience. The music of these two Latin cantors is sure to leave you with joy and spirit in your hearts.

Traditional Christmas for Jews - Chinese Food and a Movie

When I was a boy (am I really saying these words? *Oy veh!*) growing up in the Old Country (New York

City), all of the stores, restaurants, and entertainment venues were closed on Christmas day – with the important exceptions of Chinese restaurants and movie theaters. So what was a nice Jewish family to do on Christmas night? Go out to eat Chinese food and then take in a movie!

We are reviving this "sacred" tradition at Temple Ner Ami. So here's the plan:


- We will gather on Saturday night, Dec. 25 at 6PM at the Temple for *Havdalah*, a *motzie* and Chinese food (I bet that sentence has never before appeared in print!).
- The suggested donation is \$10 per person and we will make all the complex choices from Column A, Column B, egg roll soup and even Jewish fortune cookies (here's an example: "You will meet a real *mench* tall, dark, and calls his mother every day!").
- After this sumptuous feast, we will adjourn to our theater for a showing of *Defending Your Life*,

a 1991 PG rated, romantic comedy/fantasy film about a man who must justify his life-long

lack of assertiveness after he dies and arrives in the afterlife. The film was written, directed by, and stars Albert Brooks. It also stars Meryl Streep, Rip Torn and Lee Grant. Shirley MacLaine has a cameo appearance as herself, acting as the holographic host of the "Past Lives Pavilion", a reference to her publicly known belief in reincarnation. 
