Buenos Aires Cantors' Concert to Benefit Torah School

Because of its importance to our Torah School, and because of the amazing talents that I don't want you all to miss, I'm taking this space to remind you of this wonderful opportunity.

Saturday night, January 15th at 7:30PM,

Buenos Aires join us for a concert with all net proceeds going to our Torah School. Sonia and I have seen these Cantors lead services in California and Buenos Aires and we attended a concert of theirs some two years ago. They are talented, funny and entertaining (and married to each other). We adore them!

Cantors Diego Rubinsztein

and Alejandra Levi are among the pioneers of Jewish renewal in prayer through music in South America. Rubinsztein is a composer, pianist and recording artist, as well as the cantor of Libertad synagogue, the oldest and most traditional synagogue in Buenos Aires. Levi works for the Schlichei Tzibur Institute and Libertad synagogue in the Argentine capital, and is also the director of the Zimra Musical Institute. The two cantors have performed throughout the world, from New York and Miami to Brazil, Uruguay and Israel. Their latest CD is "Paths".

Jewish prayer in Argentina has a very particular musical sound and emotion. "We are always trying to create different spiritual moments," said Rubinsztein. "For that, we use a lot of melodies and styles." Cadences, rhythms and moods utilized by the two singers range from Hasidic melodies, Sephardic tunes and spirituals to lyric-free meditations — all with a

> Latin flavor. "Our idea about t'fila (prayer) is to always pray in community," said Rubinsztein. "That's why in our congregation, we're a lot of cantors, singing and leading the service together."

In our everyday lives, we don't always take advantage of unique moments and opportunities. The religious experience is, sadly, something we often don't mind





Today, *Beth Shalom* is nearing full capacity. There is still time to secure your prearrangement property before the opportunity is gone and before year end cost increases.






It's a Mitzvah! - by Julia Newman

Dear Friends,

Two years ago, Congregation of Israel marked its 130th year.

Last year, the synagogue cancelled its High Holy Day services because there was

only one person who would attend.

I called and spoke with the last active member, Marc Scher. Marc's like many of us -- a husband, a father, the owner of a family business. Type

"Scher's Bridal" on 140 Market Street, Pokomoke City, Maryland in Google Maps and you'll see his storefront, or go to his Facebook page and you'll see him standing with his wife and three daughters in front of Disneyworld.

Marc told me they might sell the temple building (purchased in 1947) not because they need the money,

but because there's just nothing to do anymore, no Jewish community to serve. The older generations have died and the younger ones "kind of just left along the way." The saddest thing, Marc told me, is that he doesn't know what to do with the prayer books, Torah scrolls, and Yartzeit boards. "I see the names of my family and friends, my grandparents and people I love," Marc reminisced. "I just don't want them to end up in somebody's forgotten, dusty attic or crawlspace, you know?"


If that happened at Congregation of Israel – a synagogue founded not long after the Civil War ended – could it happen here?

Yes, it could happen. No community, however longstanding, is immune from change and even the threat of extinction. Relevance and permanence are not granted. They are certainly not guaranteed, even if once earned.

But these things happen only if we let them happen. It's a choice we make individually and collectively.

Your temple Board has chosen to work hard to create new opportunities for growth, and thereby strengthen its ties to our Jewish community here in western Ventura County. We each have decided to do everything we can to ensure:

- · we have a temple building for our worship;
- · we have rabbis to lead and inspire us;
- · we have a religious school to teach our children;
- · we have a modern, robust website, since the future is now;



· we have life cycle events – baby namings, b'nai mitzvot, weddings, funerals, and all the Jewish holidays celebrated throughout the millennia.

This is a stark clarion call. Meeting our annual budget expenses – even

the emergency status reduced level of funding for our rabbinical salaries -- depends directly and immediately on our ongoing fundraising efforts. For this organization to survive, let alone thrive, we must all act now on our own behalf.

None of us would want to drive down Lewis Road, cast a sidelong glance at our *Temple on Temple*, and think about what should have been. None of us would want to ponder what to do with our Yartzeit boards.

Indifference kills. Your personal commitment to consistent action is the only thing that sustains this community. Each of us must now provide our fullest measure of financial, intellectual, and emotional energies Temple Ner Ami deserves. It's our responsibility. It's our privilege.

Our Goal is 200 seats in



FINALS! by Student Rabbi Lisa Bock

If you're a student, "finals" is likely a familiar term. If you're out of school, it may just be a distant memory. Well, for me, your Student Rabbi, it is "finals". So much of

my attention is on final exams and papers.

What does a Rabbinic Student study? Well, one exam is for my Fifth year Hebrew class, and in this class we translate *Midrashim*, which are stories which offer explanations of Biblical texts, and connections between texts, some of them rather obscure. And, they're written in a modified Hebrew, in a Hebrew which has been influenced by Aramaic, the 'lingua franca' of the time. Though the basic Hebrew roots are familiar, the writings are just different enough to be a challenge – to me, at

least. We also translate *Mishnah*, *Gemara*, sections of *Pirke Avo*t which is in the *Mishnah*; and we'll do much more.

What else? Well, this year I have studied Zionism and the Arab-Israeli Conflict, Lifecycle Events, Talmud, Synagogue Management, and Liturgy.

So that's a brief synopsis of what I'm up to – brief, after all, as I need to get my final papers written!

May the secular new year be a good one for all of us, with health and goodness, and an abundance of grace and peace.

SACRED STORIES OF HOLY OBJECTS

"The Pushke" by Shlomo Kreitzer

Not until I was an adult did I really understand what a "pushke" was, or what it meant from the point of view of tradition, politics, and humanity.

As a youngster, I believed

all Jewish families had a small blue metal "charity" box in their house. I assumed that, like me, every Jewish child heard, "Put 18 cents in the pushke," thousands of times.

Whenever anything good happened -arriving safely after a trip; recovering from an
illness; or even such events as getting a good
grade, having a good week, receiving an award
or special recognition or even finding a bargain
-- all these were reasons to "Put 18 cents in
the *pushke*." I didn't know why we did it. Was
it religious, charitable, or magical? Whatever it was, it was
our Jewish tradition.

For us as children, it was a moment of recognizing that our life was good; that we should manifest our gratitude some way. But why "Eighteen cents?" For us children, "Eighteen-cents-in-the-pushke" was an act of affirming life and our personal good fortune. Only later, did I learn that the Hebrew characters that represent the numbers for 18 also spell the word Hebrew word *chai*, life.

For my parents, however, who had a Jewish world view, this act was something much larger. It was an obligatory contribution to, and for, others. It was an investment in the future, specifically, in a cause to help Jews all over the world. It was a manifestation of the Jewish tradition of *Tikkun Olam*, making the world a better place.

When I was in college, I finally questioned, why a blue, locked, metal box? I read what the box said. Jewish National Fund ("JNF"). Our current *pushke* says, "Jewish National Fund is the caretaker of the land of Israel, on behalf of its owners - Jewish people everywhere." (Sadly, my original, well-used, *pushke* has disappeared.)

For over 100 years, people have contributed money to the JNF to support its efforts to purchase land, drain swamps, plant forests, build roads and create water supplies in the Holy Land. This was the dream of reclaiming a desert and recreating a "homeland" to which displaced or exiled Jews could go and live in safety.

I wonder sometimes, how did thousands of Jewish immigrants, like my parents, foresee that, 18 cents at a time, one *pushke* at a time, they could change the world? Specifically, that they could save lives and make a legitimate place for homeless Jews in the '30's and '40's, which then ultimately culminated in the State of Israel in 1948.

My wife and I contribute to other Jewish causes, usually by check. However, we also have a blue metal box in our home. We try to use it frequently and before *Shabbat*. We like the familiar sound of coins dropping into our *pushke* . . . as I remember from over 60 years ago. That's our family tradition.

The Art of Communication

New Year. Blank slate. Fresh start. Communication. 365 days to practice the Art of Communication.

1. THERE IS MORE TO COMMUNICATION THAN JUST THE SPOKEN WORD.

Communication includes many different things: facial expressions; voice intonation; and body language. Be aware of all of these when you are communicating with another person(s).

2. IT TAKES AT LEAST TWO PEOPLE TO HAVE A CONVERSATION

Even if you are communicating with G-d, you're not in this alone. As you want to be heard, it's important to hear the person you are speaking with. There are always at least two sides to every story; don't just talk and not listen.

3. TAKE RESPONSIBILITY FOR YOUR WORDS, THOUGHTS AND ACTIONS

Tf you are aware that you have said or done something that has hurt or harmed another person, approach that person and seek forgiveness. Our High Holiday prayer book (Gates of Repentance) states that ... "for transgressions against G-d, the Day of Atonement atones; but for transgressions of one human being against

another, the Day of Atonement does not atone until they have made peace with another." You don't have to wait until the Day of Atonement in order to take responsibility for your words, thoughts, and actions; seize every day as a new opportunity to be your best self.

If you are angry at what you believe another said or did to you, take responsibility and approach the person. People are not always aware that their words, thoughts or actions may have offended; give them an opportunity to take responsibility and apologize. Misplaced angers turn to resentments turn into ruined relationships.

4. DO NOT ASSUME THE WORST

This basically sums up the above three items. Every day we are given a fresh opportunity to "set the record straight" and to be our best self. If you do your very best to be your "authentic self" and communicate directly and honestly, you show respect for both yourself and the other person(s) in your life.

In Judaism we say... "do not do unto another what you find offensive to yourself." Make every day an opportunity to practice the Art of Communication.




