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Purim - Beyond the Grogger

It's easy to see Purim as the classic children's holiday. Costumes, noise, good guys and noble queens, and the baddest bad guy imaginable.

I hope you know the story. The Jews are happily living in Persia (today Iran) and are so assimilated into society that a Jew, Mordecai, can be a respected member of the community (and, at the end of the story, Prime Minister) and a Jew (Esther) can be Queen. We suspect that they are assimilated since (according to Rabbi Irving

Greenberg writing in his wonderful book, *The Jewish Way*) they are probably named after Marduk, a Babylonian god and Ishtar, a Babylonian goddess, respectively (the modern equivalent might be Mary and Christopher). When

Mordecai refuses to bow down to the evil Prime Minister Haman, Haman requests and receives permission to kill <u>all</u> the Jews. Mordecai convinces Esther to plead for her people and so, against the odds and her better judgment (her predecessor, Vashti, had been deposed for acting too independently), she asks the king for her life and the life of her people the Jews. Haman is defeated and the Jews are saved. As we read the story, we cheer Esther and Mordecai and hiss and boo the evil Haman. So what are the lessons for us some 2500 years later? Here are a few ideas:

 No matter how safe we think we have it in the Diaspora, we can never fully relax. The Jews of Persia in the 6th century BCE felt as secure as the Jews of Germany and Poland in our 20th century. In both cases a turn of leadership meant genocide.

- 2. Never write off assimilated Jews.
 Mordecai and Esther, assimilated Jews of their age, saved the Jewish people.
- 3. God works through people. One of the interesting facts about the Book of Esther (a book of the Bible currently on your shelf read it why don't you?) is that God is not directly mentioned! The

hand of God is clear in the story but it remains in between the lines. Just like today in our own lives!

4. All Jews are in it together. Haman does not decide just to murder Mordecai, or even all "non-bowing" Jews or even all

religious Jews. He decides to do away with <u>all Jews</u>. Does this remind you of anyone else? All Jews are brothers and sisters. Those who would destroy us would not single out Orthodox Jews or Conservative Jews or Reform Jews. We must remain one strong people!

5. By the way, this is yet another example of the old rule about the nature of Jewish holidays: *they tried to kill us, they didn't, let's eat!*

We can and should respond to life with joy and humor. We might imagine that Purim could be a much more sober holiday observing the near destruction of Persia's Jews. So please join us in costume and joy for our Purim service on Friday, March 18th and at our Purim Carnival on Sunday, March 20th!



Today, *Beth Shalom* is nearing full capacity. There is still time to secure your prearrangement property before the opportunity is gone and before year end cost increases.



Being Jewish in an Arab World - by Dan Harris, President

The thoughts expressed are my own, and are derived from the musings of a longtime friend, who is a Jew, now living and working in Riyadh, Saudi

Arabia. When he left for Riyadh last year, I felt (and still feel) a sense of trepidation and concern for his physical and spiritual safety. My friend reports that in Riyadh he feels safe, as long as he does not openly announce his religion. To live where one cannot feel safe openly practicing Judaism – this is different than in Camarillo, California. This is bad. This is very, very bad.

My friend recently reported that while now on vacation in Istanbul, Turkey, he walked across the Bosphorus in Istanbul to the Golden Horn--and the Jewish Museum. My friend's very gregarious and curious, so it was natural for him to make contacts for Shabbat services. He said that he attended with great joy a Sephardic, Conservative service at an ancient synagogue. The community in Turkey is 94% Sephardic. One man, originally from Urfa, Abraham's homeland, asked my friend home to Shabbat dinner with his family of three. "What a treat," he reports, "one of the great dinners of my life." No doubt, I thought. Even hearing of it made me enjoy the exotic tastes, as if I were there.

As their musical setting is utterly different from ours, the Turkish family asked him to sing prayers at Shabbat. My friend did (and sent his thanks to his Cantor Michael). Apparently, the mother liked them so much she said, "I wish we were Reform," which my friend (and I) thought was funny and heartwarming.

The next morning (on Saturday, of course) he went again and was called to the Bima to bless the scrolls. This is good. This is very, very good.

Being physically present in Arab countries is different than hearing media reports, reading articles, and seeing live video feeds on the internet. I recall my own travels in Morocco (many years ago) with a vague sense of "oh, it's not scary over there, just a bunch of people trying to navigate their daily lives, speaking a different language, eating different foods, cheering for different teams."

But the recent geopolitical upheavals in Egypt and other Arab nations still leaves me concerned. As an American Jew who is a supporter of the State of Israel, I am not blind to the threats posed to her safety.

When asked to comment on the revolutions in Egypt, Rabbi Mike Lotker succinctly reflected many of our thoughts: "We are hopeful for a more democratic Middle East and Arab lands. We are also nervous about the possibility of a more fundamentalist government taking over."

The Egyptian military's reaffirmation of the country's 1979 peace treaty with Israel has not allayed fears in Israel that the ouster of President Hosni Mubarak will bring a hostile regime to its southern border.

The Muslim Brotherhood, the largest and bestorganized opposition group in Egypt, inspired the violently anti-Israel Hamas group that rules Gaza. With the professed goal of establishing an Islamic state in Egypt, the Brotherhood won 20 percent of the vote in 2005 elections, arguably the freest the country ever had.

Three decades ago, Iranians rebelled against the autocratic regime of the shah, later to install Islamic fundamentalists. More recently, the Islamic militant group Hezbollah in Lebanon, and Hamas militants in the Palestinian territories, have been strengthened.

The Brotherhood, founded in 1928 and outlawed in Egypt 26 years later, opposes the peace treaty and endorses the right to armed resistance against Israel. Their willingness to run for office in Egypt is what has Israel and many American Jews worried, since they perceive the peace agreement with Israel as illegitimate.

"If extremist forces are allowed to exploit democratic processes to come to power to advance antidemocratic goals — as has happened in Iran and elsewhere — the outcome will be bad for peace and bad for democracy," Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu cautioned last week.

Some in Israel, however, have urged a more positive stance toward Egypt's regime change.

"Nothing good is going to come of a frightened, desperate, anti-democratic Israeli reaction," wrote commentator Nahum Barnea in Yediot.

"Many people in the West are now looking in puzzlement at Israel," he wrote. "How can it be, they ask, that the only democratic country in the Middle East has responded with fright at the prospect of a second democratic state being established alongside it?"

Neither Americans nor Israelis played a role in the push for change in Tunisia or Egypt. However, I pray that our American and Israeli democratic instincts and institutional practices guide the implementation of Egypt and the Arab world's new regimes. I pray that our real concerns are more media than reality.



THE NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY

As *Tu B'Shevat* passes and the hope of Spring is in the air, our calendar sends us the Jewish "Halloween" – Purim! Yes, we dress up like King Ahasuerus, Mordecai, Esther, Vashti, and perhaps even Haman

(boo!!!), make and eat *hamentashen*, have fun putting on and enjoying the Purim carnival, read the whole Megillah, and even put on *Purimspiels*! We get to act silly, we get to boo and cheer, and we even drink (*almost* to excess).

Yes, silly. Really silly. Even our Purim story is funny and full of comedy. When we look at the Purim story, the King is inept, and easily swayed by whoever is near him, and looks for a new wife by putting on a beauty pageant – finally selecting a Jewish woman as his new queen!

As I stopped in on the February Board Meeting for Temple Ner Ami, I noted the following at the top of their agenda:

Baruch Atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech Ha-Olam asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu la-asok b'tsorchei hatzibur.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Ruler of the Universe

Who has sanctified us with commandments And who has commanded us to occupy ourselves with the needs of the community.

The board began their meeting with the prayer above. Like Esther and Mordecai, they're here to ensure Jewish survival and serve the need of our community- though unlike Mordecai and Esther, I imagine their lives are not risking their lives to do so! They do, however, spend a tremendous amount of effort and time, occupying themselves with the needs of our community.

While our board works hard, many others do as well. You've heard about the wonderful work Phyllis Mandel does in our library. Saul Lessler works with the 7th graders on prayers. Naomi Brill coordinates our *Onegs*. A few more spend time in the temple office answering phones and helping out when the need arises. Sisterhood's Shari Brody and Sonia Lotker lead a wonderful group of women who also occupy themselves with the needs of the community. Many others whom I have not named serve our Ner Ami community in ways too numerous to count.

The lesson we can draw from Mordecai and Esther – is that these wonderful people who serve Temple Ner Ami have much in common with Mordecai and Esther. They make sure that our community not only survives, but thrives, so that we and our children can be Jewish, have a Jewish home, and have a thriving Jewish community, not only today, but for many, many tomorrows.

May we emulate Mordecai and Esther, and may the meaning and the silliness of Purim blend together and bring us joy, hope, peace and great enthusiasm!



SACRED STORIES OF HOLY OBJECTS

"The NECKLACE" by Lee Edwards

Once upon a time before Temple Ner Ami and before Jewish Families of Camarillo there was TIKVAH in Leisure Village where the "inmates" held

services once a month on Friday nights and on High Holidays. No temple; no Rabbi; no Cantor. We met in school auditoriums, church halls, the Chapel at the State Hospital in Camarillo, the Bank of Gibraltar (remember them?) – wherever we could find a hall - sometimes 400 of us at High Holidays. Services were conducted by George Goldfarb, Irv Dubin, or anyone else who would or could lead us.

One year at Rosh Hashana services, Aaron Bonderman asked me to speak about my life and that was the first time I ever told this story.

I was 10 years old and lived in Frankfurt, Germany when Hitler came to power. German Jews were – for the most part - somewhat affluent and VERY assimilated, but none of them could believe that an Austrian paperhanger would last. He would surely be out at the next election. Wrong! Conditions deteriorated for us Jews and I watched many of my classmates and their families leave for Shanghai, Chile, Palestine or even New York if they had an "affidavit" (sponsor). We did not leave because my parents would not leave my brother behind. My 19 year-old brother had been sentenced to 3 years in prison for distributing anti-Nazi leaflets. As it turned out, at the end of his sentence he was sent directly to Dachau, and from there to Buchenwald. Against impossible odds he survived three years of prison and 8 years of internment in a concentration camp.

In November 1938 on the infamous "Kristall Nacht" Nazi thugs broke into Jewish homes and businesses,

smashed all china and crystal and carted off all the Jewish men they could find in cattle trucks—my father included.

I can't imagine how my mother carried on alone. In 1939 my mother registered me to leave with the Kinder Transport and I left for England in March of that year. My mother wept as we stood together at the railway station. After the guards had inspected every child's suitcase, my mother wiped her eyes with a little handkerchief, smoothed the blanket on top of my clothing and closed my suitcase.

When I arrived in England the customs officials opened my suitcase. There under the blanket in the little crumpled handkerchief, was my mother's beautiful pearl necklace. My mother had risked

her own life and that of all the children so that I should have this souvenir!

The necklace has 9 pearls and 28 little diamonds. The last time I wore it was at my 85th birthday party - more than two years ago. It is now in trust for my brother's granddaughter who is 22 and going to Medical school in Germany.

But back in 1939 when British customs agents surveyed that little motley group of children—with no names, just numbered labels around our necks, some kind hearted men must have taken pity on me because miraculously they let me keep my necklace.

My new home became Coventry. I lived with a young Jewish couple who were newly married. They had no money but wanted to save a Jewish child from certain death. I am afraid it took many years before I realized the hardships and sacrifice

they endured in order to keep, feed and clothe me. Sometimes when the bombs fell on Coventry and we were all busy carrying water buckets to douse the flames, I took out my necklace and looked at the little diamonds dancing in the lamplight.

The war ended and I joined an American Civil Censorship group in Germany. When I was stationed in Esslingen near Stuttgart I met a handsome young man. He was a refugee like me and had served 6 years in the British Army, through Dunkirk and D-Day, and he had joined the same Censorship Division as me.

On our wedding day, March 1, 1947 in Frankfurt - in the same civil registry office were I had been registered at birth - I thought of my necklace. My mother had died in some unknown extermination camp; my father died from torture and beatings in a concentration camp shortly after I left home for England. My parents would have loved for me to wear the Necklace on my wedding day, but I had left it tucked away in a safe deposit box in London.

By 1948 we had moved back to England and awaited approval to emigrate to Canada. Finally, we got our approval and we sailed for Canada in November of that year. Have you ever crossed the Atlantic in November? I was so seasick I was SURE I was going to die, but while suffering through that experience I knew that I couldn't die because if I did, then who would wear my necklace?

We spent four years in Vancouver, British Columbia. We were happy and we both worked hard but there were no grand occasions to wear my necklace. By March 10, 1952 we had saved up \$3,000. The American Consul in Vancouver must have thought we did not pose an undue risk to the welfare of the United States so they gave us visas and we were off to the Promised Land-A.K.A. Southern California.

We lived and worked in the San Fernando Valley for 28 happy years but I rarely if ever wore my necklace; in 1980 we retired and moved to Leisure Village.

My mother wanted me to have that necklace so badly that she risked all our lives on that gray morning at the Frankfurt Railway station in 1939. I could not treasure her; I never saw her again, but I will teasure her necklace forever.




Join us for a Potluck Second Night Seder!

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HAPPY LEAP MONTH!!!



One of the oddities of the Jewish Calendar is that every few years (7 times in a 19 year cycle to be precise), we get a leap month. This is because each Hebrew month begins with a new moon and if we count 12 such lunar months, we wind up 11 days short of a full solar year. So, if we didn't do anything about this, each Jewish Holiday would come 11 days earlier each year! The problem is that the Torah specifies that Passover must come in the spring – the solution is the addition of an entire month, Adar II, or the second month of Adar.

So, in years like this, we get the extra month of Adar: it begins on March 7th and ends on April 4th. As a result, Passover is "late" this year (1st Seder on April 18th vs. March 29th last year) as is Chanukah (1st candle on Dec. 21th vs. Dec. 2nd last year). So, enjoy your bonus month!

According to rabbinic decree, none of us gets any older this month!!!


