# Why Bad Things Happen to Good People by Rabbi Michael Lotker

When Bad Things Happen to Good People is the title of a best selling book (which I highly recommend) by Rabbi Harold Kushner. Why bad things happen to good people is the question that we ask during times of global crisis (such as that of the earthquake/tsunami in Japan) or personal tragedy. It is also the most difficult question that religion has to face. Simply put, if God is all good, all powerful and all just, how is it that bad things happen to good people?

God knows! This is a very simple and very glib and not so satisfying answer but one that we must start with. We must begin with theological humility. No person should claim to know completely the mind or ways of God. In fact, I think much evil comes from those who are certain that they know exactly what God thinks about most everything. But God gave us a brain and the desire to seek to understand. I believe it's entirely kosher to ask for answers to these questions.

First, let's be clear; the problem before us is tragedy not evil. For me the question of evil is answered by God's granting us free will. We can use our brains and technology to build hospitals or gas chambers. The question is not "Where was God at Auschwitz," but "Where was humanity at Auschwitz."

Understanding tragedies is far more troubling. How to understand:

- a tsunami that kills thousands or even hundreds of thousands (the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami killed over 230,000 people in 14 countries)?
- the Haiti earthquake that killed some 200,000 and left 2 million homeless?
- the illness or accident that hurt or killed someone you love?

Broadly speaking, I can think of two answers that are consistent with

Jewish tradition. The first suggests that God is really in charge and has a grand plan addressing all such things that we mere humans cannot understand. A small child getting a vaccination thinks he is suffering unjustly but we know a wonderful medical miracle is really the result of his momentary pain. Could it be that from God's perspective, the apparent tragedies that we see are somehow part of a grand master plan? Perhaps those who suffer in this life will be rewarded in the next. Some mystics would even say that suffering in this life is a way of paying for sins incurred in prior incarnations or past lives. God knows.

I, however, align myself theologically with a very different understanding, that of Rabbi Harold Kushner, who as a young rabbi watched his innocent son sicken and die at age 14 of progeria, a disease that causes a young person to rapidly age. Rabbi Kushner concluded that God's power is limited; that God does not override natural law to work miracles. The way I think of it is that if someone shoots a bullet in the air. where the bullet comes down is addressed by my old career (physics) and not my new career (theology). The earthquake happed because of geological forces that built up and not because God decided to inflict suffering on Japan.

This might lead you to ask "Who Needs God?" It turns out that Rabbi Kushner has also written a book with this exact title. We need God not as a miracle worker but as a teacher and inspirer. God may not work magic in the world but God's influence is magical, teaching us that we should strive to solve the problems of the world, use our intelligence to cure disease, track destructive storms, make buildings earthquake tolerant, make peace, etc. and not to make war and inflict suffering. God also comforts us in prayer and study and in the people that our religions send to comfort and help in times of trouble.

One of our youngest Temple members, 10 ½ year old Ben Scheerger, recently asked his mom "Why does God make diseases?" Here was my response.

To put it as simply as possible, God makes us God's partner in making the world a better place. If God did everything for us, if the world were perfect (no diseases, no war, no poverty, etc.), what would our job be?

Maybe, we could explain it as "How would it be if mommy and daddy always did everything for you kids? We would bathe you and feed you and select your toys and friends. You would never have to do a thing, never lift a finger and never solve a problem. This might work when you are little, but it's important for you to do things for yourselves to be grown up. So too, I think that God so respects us that God only took the creation of the world so far and left it to God's partners, that's us, to complete it."

The Torah teaches us that we are made in God's image. I believe that this means that we have truly significant work to do in the world; that we are to work with God in perfecting and completing creation. But it's up to us to decide whether or not to be God's partner. God doesn't force us to do the right thing, only begs us (actually commands us) to do so.

The question so often heard is "Why me, why her, why them?" It's not a helpful question in no small part because there is no truly satisfying answer.. In my experience the helpful question is "What should I do now? How can I help?" This is a question that we can answer and, in answering it, bring comfort, help and healing to our troubled world. This is how I believe God works in the world.

May God bless and strengthen everyone facing pain and tragedy, and send God's partners to them in order to make their world and ours a happier, healthier place!

Today we scramble to fit ourselves into a culture

Children spend hours playing virtual games. Teenagers flirt by sending electronic icons to each other. We sometimes expect ourselves to function like machines, and consider basic human activities as a luxury we try to fit in when we can. However, that tiny spark of the Divine within each of us, that we call our soul, is real. It cannot be experienced in a virtual world, nor be converted to a digitalized format. Our modern world does not nourish our souls.

At Temple Ner Ami, we participate in the same activities that humans have always done, that are natural for us and make us feel alive and in harmony with the world. We gather with members of our tribe to sing and share bread and wine, to welcome new members, those just born and those who choose to join us, to celebrate the rite of passage to

adulthood, to mourn and honor our dead, and to pass on our knowledge and our faith to our children. We have festivals to celebrate the renewal of spring and the reaping of the harvest in fall. And here we practice the most quintessentially human activity of all: the conscious seeking of G\_d.

Of course there are many ways that humans seek G\_d, but our Jewish way is the best way, for us. Why has a little band of Semitic nomads survived through all the millennia, against all odds, and powerful enemies, to spread to all corners of the earth, to thrive, and to give light to the world? Where are all the other peoples in the Bible: the Philistines, the Canaanites, the ancient Romans and Greeks, the Babylonians and all the rest? They are all gone, but we are still here. The only thing that we have that they did not is our Jewish beliefs and traditions. These can best continue to sustain us in the context of our own humanity.

So come, here, to Temple Ner Ami, where you can set aside the artificial constraints of our modern world. Feel the security of being among your own tribe, as we sing, pray, celebrate and mourn. It is only when we have a connection to our own human nature that we can connect with others and with G\_d. Here is where we can experience the deep, primal satisfaction of being human.

I have the opportunity to get to know some people through their work at the Temple. This has led to my discovery that we have some amazing people, who in some

cases, volunteer a huge amount of time!

A person who fits this description is Phyllis Mandel. Phyllis replaced Ruth Nathan, (who moved) as our Temple Librarian. Phyllis is from Cleveland, and became a widow in 1951 when her husband, Abe, a Marine, was killed in Korea. She raised their three young children, who were 8, 5, and 3, by herself. When the Rabbi at her family Temple recommended her for a position, she began working at the College of Jewish Studies in Cleveland. Phyllis knew how to read and write in Hebrew and taught herself to use the Hebrew typewriter during her 13 years of service

She moved to the milder climate of California in 1968, and was hired at Occidental Petroleum in Westwood. Phyllis improved their library system, started a business library and became the Supervisor of Corporate Records during her seventeen years of employment. She moved to Camarillo just before

retiring. When Phyllis retired at the age of 65, she taught water aerobics, volunteered at Pleasant Valley Hospital and was a Hospice volunteer for the next 20 years!

When the Temple moved to our new location, Phyllis devoted 20 hours a week for the next five

months to organize and categorize our new, larger, library. On Mondays and Wednesdays, Phyllis can be found checking in the books that have been borrowed and keeping the library organized.

Phyllis has a large personal library, loves to read and belongs to two book review groups. She hopes that people of all ages will develop the good habit of reading and enjoy books as much as she does. Her son William, who also

served in the Marine Corps, lives the closest of her three children. Her daughters Marcia and Louise live in Florida and Arizona.

Many thanks to Phyllis for her experience, expertise and dedication to our Temple and library. Her generosity of time and talent is a tremendous gift to all who enter the library. # **PESACH: TWO FREEDOMS**

As I write this article for our *MEGILLAH*, we are just about to read the *Megillah* – the scroll containing the words of the Book of Esther, and celebrate Purim. I can feel Passover coming as well. In my home, we know it is

time to stop buying cereal and pasta, in anticipation of turning our household upside down in celebration of Passover. Spring cleaning comes to mind. I think about fresh tablecloths, inviting friends and family to our *Seder*, and of course, getting out the *haggadot*, the booklets we use for our dinner table service. I start looking for horseradish root in the store – yes, I do make fresh horseradish that really does bring tears to the eyes. It is these tears that bring us a physical reminder of the pain of slavery. And of course, it is from our slavery and bondage in Egypt that we celebrate our freedom.

But if we look a little deeper, it is not just physical freedom that we celebrate; we also celebrate spiritual freedom. We go from bondage to physical freedom, and we go from being unable to worship to being free to worship God.

The distinction between physical freedom and spiritual freedom is an important one. It can be a reminder that our circumstances can give us very real boundaries, and yet our spirit is nevertheless free. During the month or so before Passover, we have four *Shabbatot* that are called *Shabbat Shekalim*, *Shabbat Zachor*, *Shabbat Parah*, and *Shabbat HaChodesh*. *Shabbat Shekalim* is named for the portion of Torah we read on that *Shabbat* which discusses the half shekel (a form of currency) that each person contributes to support the portable tent in the desert, and later, to the Temple in Jerusalem. *Shabbat Zachor*, for Shabbat

of Remembrance, is an admonition to remember Amalek – Haman, the villain in the Story of Esther, is a descendant of Amalek, and *Shabbat Zachor* is the Sabbath right before Purim. *Shabbat Parah* is right after Purim, and is a reading about the Red Heifer, whose ashes were mixed with water to ritually purify anyone who was ritually impure, as only those who were ritually pure could eat from the Passover sacrifice. The fourth Shabbat is Shabbat HaChodesh, which this year is on Friday, April 1st, the 27th of Adar II. The passage read on this Shabbat deals with Passover laws, and details on the observance of Passover. A final special Shabbat is Shabbat HaGadol, the Great Sabbath, just before Passover.

On Shabbat Zachor, the Sabbath of Remembrance, we are reminded to remember Amalek. This is an opportunity for us to prepare for Passover, and assess in our own lives our physical freedom, and spiritual freedom. Amalek can be thought of as a villain against whom we must prevail, a sort of evil character that might be at the core of a goodguy, bad-guy movie. This we can think of as struggling for our physical freedom. Or, we can use the image of Amalek as a metaphor for that which stops us internally. This is the fight for our spiritual freedom. Our internal Amalek might be that voice which says, "I can't", "I'm not good enough," ...all the things we say to ourselves which stop us from accomplishing things and being our truest selves in our own lives and in the world. The internal Amalek is that voice of doubt, negativity and failure. and this is what we have the opportunity to remember. We are also instructed to forget the name of Amalek. By remembering, we are reminded to forget Amalek. Perhaps this is really a reminder to turn the volume down on that voice of doubt, negativity, and failure.

I wish for you and our whole Ner Ami family a fulfilling, meaningful, and joyous Passover.


Cecil Roth narrates in detail the beginnings of the printing of the Haggadah in medieval times through the centuries, to the invention of the printing press making the Haggadah available to everyone. Thank you Rabbi Lotker for donating this beautiful Haggadah to the library.

THE PEOPLE OF THE BOOK

In 1996 a rare book expert is offered the analysis and conservation of a mysterious, beautifully illuminated Hebrew manuscript created in 15th Century Spain. The manuscript was recently saved from destruction of the Sarajevo library in Bosnia. Trace the global journey of the Sarajevo Haggadah back from Sarajevo to Vienna in 1894; Venice in 1609; Taragona in 1492; Seville in 1480 where the manuscript's extraordinary illuminations is finally disclosed.

As water gushed through a hole made by a German torpedo, four chaplaines moved quietly among the men onboard. Preaching bravery, they distributed life jackets, including their own. In the end, these four souls went down with the ship, their arms linked in solidarity, their voices raised in prayer.



# Help Me Give the Gift of Sight - by Steve Moore



Shalom,

My name is Steve Moore and my family and I have been members of this wonderful little temple for about a dozen years. A

couple of years ago I decided to get a little more involved and joined the board. I am glad to be doing my part in helping us grow our temple into "THE" temple of Camarillo.

I love our new home. The warmth, the functionality, and it just feels more like a house of God to me than the old location. I hope that you feel the same way about our "Temple on Temple" as I do. I would love to hear any of your thoughts, whether good or bad so we can work on our weaknesses and expand on our greatness. We have a great little Jewish community here. Although it's important to me, it's not the reason for me reaching out to you today.

I was born with an eye disease called **CHOROIDEREMIA**. It is an X linked recessive retinal degenerative disease that leads to the degeneration of the *choroicapillaries*, the retinal pigment *epithelium* and the photoreceptor of the eye. In layman's terms, I'm going blind.

Choroideremia impacts my life every day. I have about a quarter of the vision of a normally sighted person and it will keep deteriorating until it is all gone. It really slows me down, especially in my business. I have to employ extra help to do the jobs that I used to easily (and more cost effectively) do myself. It gets me a little frustrated sometimes. But, a cure for Choroideremia and many other eye diseases are just in sight (maybe a little pun intended). Shoshanah Steinberg's Bat Mitzvah project was collecting eye glasses, large print books and various other vision aids. She has a macular degenerative eye disease that runs

in her family as well. Her great grandpa was blind and her Bubbe and Zeydies vision is greatly impaired.

It wouldn't be the end of the world but I'm sure you can imagine that I'm not to keen on going blind. Thank God for the FFB! The Foundation Fighting Blindness (FFB) is the worlds largest nongovernmental funding resource

for researching cures for all retinal degenerative diseases. Since it's inception in 1971, FFB has raised over \$425 million dollars towards its mission. Nearly 80 cents of every dollar donated goes to the worlds most elite and cutting edge in research science. VISION WALK is one of FFB's signature fund raising events. My sister is the President of the Jacksonville Fl. Chapter. She is helping organize the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual VISION WALK 2011 on May 21st. in Jacksonville. I will be joining her and my mom as well as my other sister and brother and my nephews on the walk to help raise funds.
