The Rabbi's Discretionary Fund

If you look at the last page of the **MEGILLAH**, vou will see a number of Temple funds to which you

can donate. One of them, the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund, is an important vehicle that I use frequently. A number of people have asked me to explain what this fund is and how it is used.

As the name implies, the Rabbi's

Discretionary Fund is a source of funds that I use to accomplish the goals of our Temple. Even though it is called "Discretionary," it doesn't mean that I have complete freedom to spend these precious funds; they must be used for a valid charitable

purpose in connection with the religious role of Temple Ner Ami.

In the years covered by my Quicken Program (2003 to present), more than \$60,000 have been donated to the fund. Uses of these funds have been extremely varied. A large fraction has been donated back to the Temple to meet specific needs. These include specific equipment items (furniture, computers, the sound system, software, etc.), services (guest

speakers, moving expenses, Israeli dancing instructors), and all kinds of odds and ends (plastic shofars for our kids on Rosh Hashanah, food for class dinners, scholarships so our students can attend a wide variety of programs, fees for our families to visit the Museum of Tolerance, etc.).

The funds are also used to help specific individuals (both Temple members and members of our community) in times of emergency. Through this Fund, you have helped feed families, provide

> nights of shelter, transportation funds and more to a wide variety of people during difficult times. The funds are also used to support local agencies such as the Jewish Federation, **Jewish Family** Services, and others who, in turn, help our community. I also use

these funds to buy educational materials such as the pamphlets in the lobby and books for the library, etc.

To ensure that the funds are use properly, I keep receipts for all expenditures and report to the Temple President annually regarding the sources and uses of the funds. Your generosity gives me and the Temple the flexibility to respond to a wide variety of needs quickly and efficiently. I hope you'll continue to be so generous.

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How NPR & Direct TV Can Help Preserve Temple Ner Ami by Dan Harris, President

National Public Radio subscriber stations are now conducting their seasonal

fundraising drives. My member station, KCLU, indicates that approximately 65% of its budget comes directly from listener support. Another 15% comes from area businesses that sponsor programming. The last 20% is derived from large private foundation donors (MacArthur, Doris Duke, etc.) and federal tax allocations.

NPR listeners enjoy an "All Access Pass" to every program broadcast, whether they donate \$0 per month, \$25 per month, or \$250 per month to support their local station. Each listener who donates is valued, because the more total donors, the greater the likelihood of obtaining area business sponsors to fill budget gaps. The greater the local support for KCLU and other member stations, the greater the likelihood of obtaining national private and public tax support. This last part is based on the reality that people try to "bet on the winning horse" and don't generally feel confident investing in any major enterprise on their own. In the end, just as no grass will grow unless it is watered, NPR stations fail when there are too many listeners and not enough vested partner members.

DirectTV, by contrast, is made available only those who pay for the service. For example, \$83.99 per month obtains the Premier Category service, which is sort of like getting "The Whole Megillah" (pun intended, with a nod of appreciation to Aaron Dvoretsky and grimace of shared pain to Sharon Speilman). As DirectTV itself says: "We're committed to bringing you the world's best television experience for the best possible price with no startup costs and no equipment to buy. With DirectTV, you'll enjoy innovative programming, technology and services you won't find anywhere else. This is our promise to you." Even if you had the television running 24 hours a day,

and packed the living room with all your family and neighbors, the cost is still \$83.99 per month.

But every investment (like in this case, consuming non-stop entertainment) comes at a price, since "As a new DirectTV customer, you agree to maintain DirectTV service for a minimum of 24 months. We're sure you'll love DirectTV so much that you won't ever want to switch." This last bit – despite the happy, hopeful language – is what mortgage bankers call a "Prepayment Penalty." It's designed to and actually punishes consumers for changing their minds before the company makes its projected profit over a specific period of time.

These two well-known business models may offer Temple Ner Ami guidance moving forward. Historically, 65-70% of Temple Ner Ami's annual operating budget comes from membership dues. Unlike the NPR model, although we are grateful for and do receive some help from the Jewish Federation of Ventura County, we cannot count on shrinking tax dollars and major donations to fill remaining budget gaps. Unlike DirectTV model, we do not impose multi-year financial obligations on our members, nor is the "plug pulled" in the case of a monthly non-payment.

Our financial matters find root in the context of Jewish values, principles, ethics, and uniquely important tradition in Ventura County, and so historically, the Board of Directors has determined to foster multi-generational Judaism regardless of individual financial circumstance.

Unlike the for-profit business DirectTV, Temple Ner Ami's core purpose is not based on payment of financial dividends to its members, but is instead to worship God in accordance with Jewish tradition, to cultivate a love and understanding of our shared Jewish heritage, to stimulate fellowship in the Jewish community, and to strengthen the bonds of loyalty with the Jewish People everywhere. Our congregation

has indicated its desire to promote Judaism in all aspects of life through public and private worship, religious education, and through social welfare activities and such other means as helps to convey the teachings of Judaism.

But Temple Ner Ami's non-profit status does not, and cannot, be translated to mean financially strapped and/or cash-flow challenged. To speak more plainly, reflect on how you personally would feel having to pull money from your savings account to pay for ongoing and important monthly expenses, as opposed to counting on incoming cash-flow to meet those needs (your paycheck or social security). Drawing on reserves is a predictable - although not cherished - event, and our reserves have simply not been adequate to meet all our monthly obligations, including membership in the Union for Reform Judaism and replenishing our reserved and non-reserved building funds.

Reasonably forecasted and consistently realized income streams form the core of any successful business enterprise, including ours. At present, the Board is contemplating structural changes to its dues, in an effort to provide for greater budget clarity, ease of administration, and regularity of income, with an eye to promoting and consistently implementing its core purpose.

I'd like your immediate confidential feed-back on altering the Temple's dues structure based on automatic monthly payments, similar to how we all typically pay for car and mortgage loans. I'd also like your immediate confidential feed-back on reducing our budgetary need for "event driven" fundraisers, so that moving forward, a greater percentage of our annual obligations are met by monthly membership dues based on the total number of member families who are blessed to called Temple Ner Ami home.

Counting the Omer: On Our Way to Mt. Sinai & Receiving the Torah by Student Rabbi Lisa Bock

In Leviticus, the third book of the Torah, it says, "You shall count... from the day that you brought the Omer as a wave offering" (23:15). The Omer was a measure of barley

that Jews brought as an offering to the Temple in Jerusalem on the second day of Passover. The Biblical injunction is to count the forty-nine days from the second day of Passover until the eve of Shavuot. Although we no longer bring barley to the Temple, these seven weeks are still known as the "the Omer," a week of weeks, and the ritual of counting each night is known, not surprisingly, as "Counting the Omer."

First we have Passover and then Shavuot - which always arrives fifty days later - these are holidays that are connected to one another, and the week of weeks in between is always the same amount of time. While Passover celebrates our liberation from Egypt, Shavuot celebrates our receiving the Torah at Sinai. In our counting the Omer, we symbolically mark the time between our liberation to our receiving the Torah. Receiving the Torah is a significant moment in Jewish life – it is the assumption of responsibility in the acceptance of Torah, the law, making a collective commitment to living an ethical, and moral life, a life of virtue, a life of Divine purpose. We recreate this in our passing the Torah from generation to generation to each of our children who become Bar and Bat Mitzvah on our bimah!

The Hebrew word for Egypt is *mitzrayim*, a word that can also be translated as "the narrow place", from the word *tzar*, or "narrow". In our lives today, mitzrayim can represent all forms of conformities and definitions that restrain, inhibit, or otherwise restrict our free movement and expression. In retelling the Exodus story on Passover, we are symbolically freed, or birthed from the "narrow straits" through the miracle of the parted waters of the Sea of Reeds, into freedom. Like babies and toddlers, we as a people, and as individuals, were not yet sufficiently mature to receive the Torah at Sinai. The period between Passover and Shavuot is an opportunity to us today, now, for our personal growth and character refinement. The Counting

of the Omer is more than just counting days. This is a yearly opportunity designed to grow and refine ourselves, built right into our tradition.

Counting the Omer requires attention and intention. Counting each of the days from Passover until Shavuot sounds simple, but it is not easy. It requires attention and intention – or a mindfulness – to remember to count each night. Like learning a new language, practicing an instrument, or starting an exercise routine, counting the Omer is demanding. However, just as these other disciplines reward us in both expected and unexpected ways, so too the counting for 49 days stimulates a sense of accomplishment, new awareness, and mindfulness.

If you look at your Jewish Calendar, you'll see it has "Omer: ##" on each of the days beginning April 20^{th} through June 7^{th} .

For New Awareness. From now through June 7th, consider taking some personal character trait, such as *patience*, *kindness*, *inner strength*, *love*, *courage*, *creativity*, *harmony*, *compassion*, *discipline*, *order*, *judgment*, *balance*, *clarity*, and so forth – take one trait and put your attention on that for a day, a few days, or even a week - write the trait you want to focus on – write it on a piece of paper and carry it with you - be aware of that quality in your life - make that trait part of your awareness as you go through each day. Reflect on areas you want to strengthen, and refine, and see how you can apply that each day. As you count the days up to Shavuot, notice that this opportunity to grow and refine ourselves is a part of our Jewish tradition.

Counting the Omer: The Blessing

Baruch Atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech HaOlam, Asher Kid'shanu B'mitzvotav, V'tzivanu Al S'firot HaOmer.

Blessed are You Adonai, Our God, Ruler of the Universe, Who has made us holy through Your mitzvot, and has commanded us concerning counting the Omer.

Today is the ____ day of the Omer.

May your journey to Sinai and Shavuot be filled with growth, refinement and blessings!


Annual CSUCI Hillel Officer Installation at Temple Ner Ami

Annelies Regen was raised in Aachen, Germany during the events prior to World War II. As a child, she recalls not being able to play with her best friend, swim in the public swimming area or go to the theater because she was Jewish . Annelies's mother was a friend of Anne Frank's

grandmother, so Annelies and her sister, Susie, were playmates of the slightly younger Ann. From Aachen, Annelies and her family were able to walk on forest trails which crossed the borders in to Holland and Belgium.

When Annelies was thirteen, she was sent to a boarding school in Belgium. Just before her sixteenth birthday, she was able to go to California, as there were fewer people waiting to come to the United States from Belgium than from Germany. She lived with her uncle and aunt in Los Angeles until her parents and sister could come a few years later and the family was reunited.

Annelies met Ruddy Regen and they were married in 1944. They enjoyed a 54 year marriage until his passing in 1997. She has a daughter, Nancy, who lives in Camarillo and two grand daughters.

Before moving to Camarillo in 1992, Annelies worked at several banks and after two robberies, she left banking. Her next position was as an Office Manager in a private office where she worked for thirteen years until she retired. She has volunteered at the Jewish Home for the Aging as well as the Woman's Care Cottage in North Hollywood. Annelies volunteers at our Temple on Fridays and has done so for the eleven months since our move. She has also been our Sisterhood Treasurer for years.

Annelies has had many interesting life experiences and is a charming and delightful woman to know! She plays Bridge, exercises and is Past President of ORT America where she had served eleven years as the group's President. Bravo, Annelies and many thanks for your many years of devotion and service to others!


JUDAISM 101



Jewish community celebrates

All were welcome Tuesday night at Temple Ner Ami in Camarillo for the temple's annual community Seder. The Passover Seder is an ancient Jewish tradition celebrating the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt.

The term "Passover" refers to the Old Testament story of when the Angel of Death passed over the homes of the slaves during a plague that was killing all the firstborn children of Egypt.

The first night of Passover was Monday, which is usually celebrated with a family Seder. The second night is traditionally a community Seder.

Rabbi Mike Lotker read from a special prayer book called the Haggadah, which details the exodus of the slaves from Egypt.

After reading aloud and singing songs both traditional and original, everyone dined on traditional Passover fare of wine and matzah bread, an unleavened bread to symbolize how quickly the slaves had to flee Israel. There was no time for the bread to rise.

This year's Passover is especially poignant, he said, as the Jewish community watches many in the Middle East struggle for independence.

"All across the Middle East, our fellow Semites are striving to get what we have in the state of Israel ... which is freedom," he said.





Following her recovery, Beth worked tirelessly for 20 years at a non-profit that supported young-adults with cancer. After retiring, and moving to Somis she continued to fulfill her promise—to make a difference in the lives of others.

And so, the Somis Pantry. Co-founded in October 2008 with childhood friend, Julia Newman, the Pantry primarily serves families in Somis and Camarillo. All of the families are considered working poor, have fallen on hard times or are unemployed. Somis Pantry is an agency of Food Share, the Ventura County food bank. It feeds 65 families a monthapproximately 300 people. Beth also organizes an annual clothing drive each Fall.

Gathering food to feed this many people a month is nearly a full-time job. Beth puts in 20-30 hours a week going to Food Share, local markets, and speaking to local philanthropic organizations to raise money to purchase food.

> was nominated to receive the honor by **Patti Pape**, the Principal of Somis School. In receiving this award Beth was noted to have courage, vision, dedication and tenacity.
