Does Prayer Work?

Does prayer work? Yes. I am certain that it does! Central to understanding what I mean by

this is understanding what I mean by "prayer" and by "work."

It is easy to confuse prayer with magic and God with the Supreme Magician. Magical prayer suggests that if I can just say the right words (in Hebrew certainly) at the right time (Shabbat, Pesach, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur) maybe accompanied by the right ritual (a tallit around my shoulders, maybe *teffilin* around my arm and head and bowing, standing and going up on my toes at just the right moment), then God will listen to my pleas and do what I ask. The goal of this effort is to make my will_and desires *God's will*. One would hope that the prayer would be for something noble like peace, healing the illnesses of friends and family, protection for our soldiers, comfort for the victims of the world's problems and avoiding those ills ourselves. But sometimes, it has to do with the next big test, an important date or the lottery.

It's interesting that this is the kind of prayer that scientists love to study. My understanding is that when fairly and scientifically examined in a true double blind controlled study, this kind of magical prayer is proved not to work. For example, if a group of people are praying for person A but not for person B, and A and B are not aware of these prayers, there does not seem to be any effect. Surprise of surprises, magic, even religious magic, doesn't work!

But consider a slight variation on this approach which I will call *majestic* prayer. In majestic prayer, the idea is

that if I can just say the right words (in Hebrew perhaps) at the right time (Shabbat, Pesach, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur) maybe accompanied by the right ritual (a tallit around my shoulders, maybe *teffilin* around my arm and head and bowing, standing and going up on my toes at just the right moment), then I can better set my mind and will so that *God's will* and commandments will become *my will*.

I love the way that our old prayer book, *The Gates of Prayer*, puts it (page 81): "Pray as if everything depended on God; act as if everything depended on you. Who rise from prayer better persons, their prayer is answered."

The God I believe in is not some kind of cosmic Amazing Randy who can and will work miracles that violate the laws of nature if the requester knows the secret formula for the request. The God I believe in is a Teacher and Law Giver who has told us what we need to do to work miracles in our lives and in the lives of people around us. But it's not easy and it doesn't come naturally. We have to remind ourselves what is ethical and noble (through study and prayer) and organize ourselves into mitzvah teams to do this work (this is why I have no problem with "organized" religion).

I know and I'm sure that you know that this prayer works. These kinds of mitzvah teams (Jewish and otherwise) feed the hungry, treat the ill, comfort the bereaved, and even risk their very lives often for the sake of people they have never met. This kind of prayer has changed my life and can change yours.

Majesty not Magic. God's will becoming my will and not the other way around. Amen!

Plain Talk about Temple Finances

Your Board of Directors has realized that it is essential that each of our members have a clear understanding of the financial needs of our temple. Although financial information is shared at our annual meeting and can be made available on request any time, we are aware that being presented with columns of figures does not always lead to clarity. We want each of you to get "the big picture." Our basic annual operating expenses have been approximately \$330,000 per year. This includes rent, clergy, cantorial services, wages, utilities, and Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) dues. We receive \$148,000 per year in dues (based on 2009-2010 figures.) With 197 memberships, this comes to an average dues received of approximately \$750. Other sources of income such as Torah school tuition, annual giving, High Holiday pledges, general donations, and fundraising have not closed the gap between our expenses and income.

How have we managed? We have reduced our expenses by moving to a shared space, decreasing the Rabbi's hours, and becoming delinquent on our URJ dues. We have spent the money that Shirley Sussman bequeathed, money the board had put in a general building fund. Our Torah school principal, Julia Newman, has worked without pay since she took over this position. Recognizing that it is unfair to ask critical professional staff to work without compensation, our indomitable Arla Crane raised a substantial amount of money to fund the principal's position, much of it by running marathons. These sources are not available to us now. There is no more general building fund. Arla cannot be expected to raise this kind of money again, nor can we ask Julia to continue to work without compensation. In addition some of our most generous members have moved and left the temple.

While we will always have fundraisers and giving campaigns, it is critical that we raise more revenue through dues. Dues should cover at least 90% of our fixed, basic operating expenses. Then we can use other income that comes in to build up our reserves (which are presently close to zero), replenish our general building fund in order to honor the wishes of our benefactor, become current in our URJ dues in order to support our parent organization as our members support Temple Ner Ami, and use as seed money for a pre-school.

In order to achieve our goals, your board has decided to raise

annual membership dues. We hope you will see your new dues as a guide only and will pledge more if you are able, in order to make up for the many congregants who cannot pay their full dues. Although Temple Ner Ami is a business in the sense that we have bills that must be paid in order for us to operate, we hope you will not think of your temple as a fee-for-service business. We are not like a country club or gym where you are charged a certain fee and can't join if you can't pay. Ner Ami is more like a coop where each member contributes as much as he or she can.

Many of our members who are in special discounted categories and can pay more, give generously at other opportunities throughout the year. While all donations are always appreciated, we would like you to consider adding what you can to your annual dues pledge as a first priority, and as a secondary priority, give at other opportunities as you are able. The reason for this is that dues pledges give us a predictable source of income that we can use for our budget. Fundraisers are difficult to count on. They require a chairperson and a committee with the time and energy to devote and the outcome can be unpredictable. An example of this is the Cantors concert, which was promoted and tickets sold, but had to be cancelled because the Cantors could not get passports. Another example is the Hanukah Boutique, where attendance was low due to rain.

Members of Temple Ner Ami do not have to be persuaded of the importance of maintaining our Jewish home for worshiping, learning, gathering, and preserving our heritage for future generations You already believe this. That is why you are members. Armed with the knowledge of the financial issues we face, we can work together to keep our temple's eternal light burning.

Rabbi Mike, author of A Christian's Guide to Judaism (Paulist Press, 2004), will describe how the two faiths can move forward as one community. "This outreach program will enable us to learn more about each other's history, theology and practices. By discovering our similarities rather than dwelling on our differences we can form not only acceptance but friendships as well," said Kimball.

He is highly regarded in academic circles and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America university network for his deep understanding of Lutheran higher education. Kimball received his master's and doctorate degrees in history.





"SISTERS IN DA' HOOD" News

Our Mimouna Celebration was an absolute success. It was very well attended. If you were unable to participate, we hope you will join us next year. Our professional Croatian performer (Natasha Senkovitch) gave an amazing belly dancing performance. She introduced us to various belly dancing styles such as: cane dancing, sword dancing, Egyptian dancing, veil dancing, and much more. After her performance, Natasha made herself available to answer questions, and joined us for our Mimouna celebration.

"Mimouna is a Moroccan Jewish tradition that brought together members of the Moroccan community – Jewish and Muslim – on the last night of Passover. Families, neighbors and friends would stroll from home to home, sharing sweets and greetings as part of a communal celebration. This celebration is now celebrated at many Jewish Temples throughout the US, as well as Canada."

The traditional Mimouna table displays a large variety of sweets and pastries, as well as many symbolic items. Moroccan Mint tea is usually served. Our own Mimouna table was beautifully decorated with silk tablecloths, gorgeous flowers and hand made Moroccan copper platters. A big Toda Raba to all the ladies who brought a large assortment of Middle Eastern pastries, fruit platters, assorted nuts and dried fruit, and delicious "American" cookies.

The most common explanation for the origin of Mimouna has to do with its name – this celebration is most often linked to the birthday of Rabbi Maimon, the father of Maimonides (Rabbi Moshe ben Maimon). Mimouna is also portrayed as a festival of emuna (faith), because of the phonetic similarity between the words.




Behind Our Tree of Life Leaves — The Rest of the Story

(Harriet recently purchased Tree of Life leaves to honor her mother and late husband. Here is her story. Ed.)

My mom was always the person I wanted to hang out with. She was more fun than most of the girls my own age. She was orphaned at about age 5 and grew up in the Brooklyn Hebrew Orphan Assylum (BHOA). I benefitted from her courage and strength. She was always ready to have fun in a creative way. She used to show me how to make something from nothing. For example: an empty shoe box became a doll carriage or a train or a place to hide treasures. I became a hit with my grandchildren doing similar creative activities. She also taught me a very long nightly prayer which I have repeated for about 60 years. My own children gave up. She used to use





this as a way to get my sister and myself to go to sleep. She said we weren't permitted to speak after we said, "Amen" and we fell for that.

At about 85, she and my dad left Brooklyn and moved to Leisure Village. Now, at 95, she has moved into Emeritus Assisted Living, and she is having a wonderful time. I haven't heard her laugh so much in years. She is really involved in activities and people around her.....and sometimes, I feel left out.

Morty: my late second husband was the light of my life (no pun intended since our last name is Lit). He brought me back to my Jewish roots and encouraged me to become a Bat Mitzvah.

He was the widower of my best friend when I lived in West Hills. His first wife's name was Harriet Lit also. It was very confusing to friends and family, so we called each other: "the other Harriet" When we fell in love and married I was living in Portland, Oregon and he moved up there to be with me and also to give me a chance to adjust to being Harriet Lit without other people saying, "but you're not Harriet Lit". We could never have her Yahrtzeit celebrated in Temple because people would think that I had passed.

There are many more stories about how this was a love that was meant to be.
