A Prayer for the New Year

With the beginning of the month of September, we begin the Hebrew month of Elul. In our tradition, Elul is a time for introspection, for examining the past year; for thinking about the mistakes that we made, apologies we need to seek, and what we can do to make the coming year better. In this light, looking ahead to Rosh Hashanah at the end of this month, I offer the following thoughts.

The past year and years have been wonderful for Sonia and me. It has been an honor and privilege to serve this amazing community and to finally move into it (only a few more boxes to go!). Our lives have been enriched by your warmth and friendship and, with God's help, we look forward to many more years here in Camarillo.

This year will be one of transition and planning as Temple Ner Ami continues its important work and prepares for the future. My prayer is that we strengthen our resolve to be a home for all the Jews of our community and their friends. God has entrusted us with the responsibility to do holy work – to make our community and our world a better place. We can do this only by addressing our mission in the broadest possible sense.

If we become divided, if we only serve narrow elements of our

community, our seniors or our school children, we fail. If we are only a Torah School for our children, if Jewish education ends at the ripe old age of 13 or even 16, the result will be that we teach these young minds (and confirm in our own minds) that Judaism is indeed childish and not a topic for serious, adult engagement. On the other hand, if we focus only on the needs, interests and concerns of our esteemed seniors, we abandon the future of our people.

No, Temple Ner Ami ("the Light of My People") must be a shining beacon for all the Jews of our community. The Jewish ideal is for lifelong study and engagement with God, sacred ideas and sacred texts. This wrestling with the holy (remember that the word Israel means "one who wrestles with God") should begin with our preschoolers learning the Alef-Bet and the holidays and continue with adult classes and Torah Study. I pledge to support Temple Ner Ami's Board and members as we seek to fulfill this sacred covenant that we entered into with God some 3200 years ago at Mount Sinai.

Sonia and I look forward to a year of transition and growth, of making new friends and of deepening old friendships, of prayer, of learning and of serving God and our community.

MOVIE NIGHT SATURDAY NIGHT AUGUST 27, 6:30 PM



An American movie with common Jewish/American themes: role of tradition, dilution of traditional practices, "rebellious" young adult children, courage, following one's dream, conformity, etc.

Shlomo Kreitzer will

introduce the film and lead a discussion afterwards. For example, "Have you been in a Marjorie Morningstar situation? What did you do? How did it work out?"

Marjorie Morningstar is a 1958 melodrama film based on the 1955 novel of the same name. The film, directed by Irving Rapper, tells a fictional coming of age story about a young Jewish girl in New York City in the 1950s. The film's trajectory traces Marjorie Morgenstern's attempts to become an artist - exemplified through her relationship with the actor and playwright Noel Airman.

The central conflict in the film revolves around the traditional models of social behavior and religious behavior expected by New York Jewish families in the 1950s, and Marjorie's desire to follow an unconventional path.

The film is notable for its inclusion of Jewish religious scenes - including a Passover meal, a synagogue sequence and Jewish icons in the Morgenstern house. These depictions were one of the first times Jewish religion was portrayed overtly in film since *The Jazz Singer* in 1927. *Marjorie Morningstar* is also notable for its role in propagating the stereotype of the Jewish American Princess as well as the Jewish mother stereotype. Ironically, it gave star Natalie Wood a public reputation as a pioneer Jewish film actress, though in fact Jewish women had been acting in Hollywood for decades and Wood was not Jewish.

What is Teen Connection?

Teen Connection is a multi-component program that meets the varied needs, interests and schedules of today's teens.

What are the "components" of Teen Connection?

- NAUTY (Ner Ami United Temple Youth-a division of NFTY) provides social, recreational, social action and leadership activities for senior high teens.
- A Place of Our Own provides a setting where teens can comfortably meet and engage in activities and dialogues which assist them in their maturing process and the strengthening of their Jewish identity. Lead by a facilitator with Masters Degrees in Social Work & Jewish Communal Service.
- Confirmation, lead by our Student Rabbi, focuses on life's big issues: beliefs that have lasting and important value. Students will have the opportunity to think, formulate, and share their beliefs. Through study of Torah and sacred texts, students will explore the richness of Judaism and how its teachings are pertinent to their lives.
- Choices is our 8th grade teen program. It is aptly named because of the variety of activities: social, academic and leadership that it provides. One of the components of Choices is the Madrichim (classroom assistant) program.

In July, I attended the Animal Rights National Conference in L.A. My daughter, Debra Erenberg, spoke at many of the workshops and gave the closing speech. Debra is currently the Midwest Regional Director for Amnesty International. Her career path includes: nonprofit attorney, grantwriter and grassroots organizer for such organizations as - **PETA** (People For the Ethical Treatment of Anima.s), **NARAL** (National Abortion Rights Action League), **CSPI** (CEenter fo Science in the Public Ingterest), and **RAN** (Rainforest Action Network).

Debra lives a principled life. She is passionate about all of the causes which are part of *Tikkun Olam*: healing the world through environmental activism and the protection of human and animal rights.

At this conference I learned about the spiritual side of animals. Just look into the eyes of your companion animal and you can be certain of a soul connection. Debra, and most of these activists, are vegans. When I am with them I try to follow their example. I know in my heart that they are right. If you look into the eyes of a cow or a pig you can feel emotion. So how can

we kill, torture, experiment on and eat these sentient beings? Some of the reasons for not giving up meat are: it's too difficult to change, I'm lazy, it's tradition, or just that we are so



distanced from our food source that we don't put a face to the piece of roast beef on our plate.

Let's all be a force for change this coming year. Become a vegetarian or a vegan three days a week. You might notice a positive change in your health just knowing that you are killing fewer cows, pigs, chickens, turkeys, and fish and reducing your carbon footprint.

The *Tikkun Olam* Committee is looking for new members and new ideas. Our goal is to make a positive impact in the lives of people and animals. We continue to volunteer at the Rescue Mission, and Somis Pantry, do hospital visitations; and arrange carpools to Temple.





August Selection for Discussion: Cutting for Stone

Lauded for his sensitive memoir (My Own Country) about his time as a doctor in eastern Tennessee at the onset of the AIDS epidemic in the 80s, Verghese turns his formidable talents to fiction, mining his own life and experiences in a magnificent, sweeping novel that moves from India to Ethiopia to an inner-city hospital in New York City over decades and generations. Sister Mary Joseph Praise, a devout young nun, leaves the south Indian state of Kerala in 1947 for a missionary post in Yemen. During the arduous sea voyage, she saves the life of an English doctor bound for Ethiopia, Thomas Stone, who becomes a key player in her destiny when they meet up again at Missing Hospital in Addis Ababa. Seven years later, Sister Praise dies birthing twin boys: Shiva and Marion, the latter narrating his own and his brother's long, dramatic, biblical story set against the backdrop of political turmoil in Ethiopia, the life of the hospital compound in which they grow up and the love story of their adopted

parents, both doctors at Missing. The boys become doctors as well and Verghese's weaving of the practice of medicine into the narrative is fascinating even as the story bobs and weaves with the power and coincidences of the best 19th-century novels. 

A Blond and a Jew Walk into a Bar.... by Dr. Gregg Hartman

Actually, this is a true story, but let me start over. Sharon and I walked into in a bar, and we sat down and started to have a conversa-

tion. The subject was very simple. Why are we paying our temple dues? Is the purpose of our dues to pay the electric bills and pay the rent? It is to pay the Rabbi's salary? Or is it bigger than that? Are we trying to build a Jewish Community for our children, and for Jewish families in Camarillo?

I believe that it is the latter. Paying the money gets us the brick and mortar, but building a Jewish Community takes a lot more. When we buy a stock, we think about our return on investment. When we join an organization, we think the same. Is this a good investment? How can I maximize my return on that investment? The answer to these questions is very simple. PARTICIPATE.

I know every single reason that you can come up with as to why you don't participate. Believe me, I have used every one myself, and have probably used some that you haven't thought of yet. But let me give you just one reason that you should get involved: so that your family has a Jewish Community to identify with.

I remember, as a child, being excited to go to temple. I didn't necessarily like sitting through services, but I had a group of friends that made it fun. We ate our Oneg cookies in the youth room, my dad would talk to the other members of the brotherhood, and my mom with the sisterhood ladies. When new Jewish families would move into the area, we would invite them to join us for services, or some other function. Currently in our community, that could be a problem. Some time ago I attended a brotherhood meeting with Steve Moore. In addition to the two of us, there were four other people there. Imagine if I had brought a new potential member to that function. I would have spent the majority of the night apologizing, and explaining how "it's not usually like this."

Since then the Brotherhood has ceased to exist. In hopes of resurrecting some kind of brotherhood, Steve and I started a men's poker group. We get together about every other month and it has grown into a two poker table event – not including the large table of great food. Even though we are not calling ourselves "the Brotherhood of TNA" we as Jews are trying to congregate because that's what we do as Jews.

So why should anyone belong to the temple? If you're just looking for a place to go for the High Holidays, fine. But if you feel like me – that a temple should be the center of the Jewish Community, then help me. Make a commitment to yourself, to your children, to your grandchildren, and to your fellow congregants to take an active part in our Jewish community.

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



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GIRL TALK: A SUCCESSFUL PILOT PROGRAM

What is Girl Talk?

Girl Talk is a structured psycho-educational program that promotes teen self awareness, Jewish identity, the application of Jewish values to daily life, communication, and social skills, made possible by a grant from the Jewish Federation of Ventura County. The teens and I have met once per week for an hour and a half, throughout the summer. We had 9 girls participating, with ages ranging from 11 to 14 years.

Here are a few of the topics covered:

- Self Awareness, Formation of Identity.
- Jewish Values (corresponding to a wide variety of topics discussed).
- Difference between want and need.
- Role of education in goal achievement.
- · Learning disabilities' impact on siblings.
- Gifted Students and socialization at school.
- Friendship skills.
- Identifying the characteristics that make a good friend.
- Selecting friends (according to similar interests and value system).
- Breaking confidentiality (divulging secrets when a friend appears to be at risk).
- Verbal and non-verbal communication skills.
- Projection of confidence through appropriate body language.
- · General and specific conflict resolution skills.
- Negotiation techniques (with siblings and parents).
- How to show respect to parents.
- Accepting compromises.
- Identifying negative behaviors.
- · Taking responsibility.
- Making a structured apology.
- Validation/positive feedback.
- Using self control.
- Coping with jealousy.
- · Relaxation techniques.

And much more.

All topics were tied to supporting Jewish values. For example, when discussing friendship, the concept of Lashon Harah (gossip and inappropriate speech) was discussed. When discussing developing one's own identity, the role of temple and community was brought up, since developing friendships with other Jews reinforces Jewish identity, etc.

Since **GIRL TALK** started as a Pilot Program, at the end of each meeting, each participating young lady was asked to rate what she had learned compared to previous knowledge (scale of 1

to 10). The average rating was 8+.

Because of parents' interest and high ratings, our Torah School Principal, Julia, has decided to continue the program throughout this school year.

It is our hope that the extra time will allow the girls to go over topics in more depth, as well as being exposed to other topics of significance.

It is important to note that Girl Talk does not have to be for girls only. This program can be adapted to boys as well. A parallel program can be designed for parents, with emphasis on parent/child relationship, discipline and/or other topics.

Here are some of the specific improvement results: Some of the teens started to negotiate with younger siblings, some used and body and communication skills to make requests, surmount shyness, and much more. However, my favorite comment came from a participant who declared that her mother is not crazy after all! This comment from a teen? Now that's what I call improvement!

How Was Your Summer?What did you do *Jewish* this summer?

By the time you read this, it will be the beginning of the month of *Elul*, which is the last 30 days leading up to *Rosh*

Hashanah.

Why would I say the last 30 days, leading up to Rosh Hashanah?

Because we have been on a journey, leading up to the High Holy Days, all summer long. Let me explain.

If we look closely at our Torah, we see that in the book of Exodus, the Exodus from Egypt begins on the 15th of *Nisan*. This year this was a while back—April 19th. If that sounds familiar, it should. That was the first day of Passover. If you want to confirm this, go to Exodus, Chapter 12, and your calendar!

By June 3rd, the 1st of *Sivan*, we had been travelling, and we entered the wilderness of Sinai (Exodus 19:1), and it was at this time that Moses goes up to speak with God (Exodus 19:3). Our Torah relates in chapters 19 and 20 that God speaks the 10 Commandments, or ten utterances, to Moses, and "all the people witness the thunder and lightning."

So far, so good. However, Moses goes back up the mountain right around *Shavuot* (June 8-9), and remains there for 40 days. During those 40 days, the Israelites get restless, worried and bored.

What do we do when we get bored? (If you have kids bored over the summer, you know.) We get into trouble. We built the molten calf (Exodus 32:1). A few verses later, at the end of the 40 days, God gives Moses the tablets of the pact (Exodus 32:18). Now the Israelites are in trouble. God sees what they're doing at the base of the mountain, and tells Moses that He will destroy the people and start over just with Moses. Moses implores God to renounce this punishment, and God does. Instead, Moses comes down the mountain himself, shatters the tablets, destroys the molten calf, and punishes the people (Exodus 32:19-29). The date that this corresponds to in our calendar is 17th Tammuz, and this past summer, this was July 19th. This is traditionally a fast day.

A couple of days later, Moses goes back up the mountain to ask forgiveness for the people. This isn't readily granted. Moses negotiates with God, and it takes weeks. By the 9th of Av, there is a culmination of three weeks of mourning – the Israelites are mourning what has happened, and mourning the damage that has been done in their relationship with God. Then begins seven weeks

of consolation, during which even our *Haftarah* readings – the selections from the books of the Prophets - are chosen to reflect themes of consolation.

On the 1st of *Elul*, this year, August 31st, Moses carves two tablets (that will become the 2nd set of the Commandments), and again pleads for forgiveness for the people (Exodus 34:1-9), and God responds with the covenant. Moses writes on the tablets and this concludes 40 days. (Exodus 34:27-28).

Finally, after 40 days and nights, Moses comes down Mt. Sinai with the tablets of the pact (Exodus 34:29). After a long time, with Moses pleading, negotiating, and waiting, God has granted the Israelites forgiveness, and the Israelites have been given the Covenant. This is *Yom Kippur*, the 10th of *Tishri*, and this year, this is October 8th.

What next? Well, what do we do as soon as *Yom Kippur* is over?

We build a *sukkah*! On the 15th of *Tishri*, this year, October 13th, Leviticus 23:33-36 instructs us that this is the Feast of Booths – a *sukkah* is a booth – to last 7 days, with an additional 8th day, because it is such a joyous time. This is a celebratory time, like a reunion or wedding. Leviticus 23:39-43 also instructs about the *Lulav* – more about that later!

So what does this tell us?

This tells us that just as we know that summer is a time of rest and relaxation from many of our normal activities, especially for those who are in school, teach, or have children or grandchildren in school, it is also a time of preparation.

The summer is a time of preparation for your Rabbis, your temple staff, religious school teachers, and also for you. Just as we know that summer leads to the fall, summer, looking through a Jewish perspective, is also a time of preparation for the High Holy Days. The 30 days of *Elul* are an especially intense time to prepare for the internal work that we do which culminates in the High Holy Days. It takes time and intention to inquire within our own hearts on the questions that only each of us can answer.

A couple of years ago, I developed a checklist of questions of my own, though you will likely – may and should - develop your own:

High Holy Days Checklist:

- What are my values?
- Are my values consistent with Jewish Values, with To-

rah?

- What are my priorities?
- Are my priorities consistent with my values?
- What actions fill my days?
- Are my actions consistent with my values and priorities?
- Do I have balance in my life?
- When I am gone, what do I want to be known for?
- If the Divine asked me one question, what would it be? How would I answer?
- If I could ask the Divine one question, what would that be?

One last thought – the High Holy Days are a time of repentance, return, and renewal. We must remember as we do the internal, evaluative work of preparing our "selves" for the High Holy Days, that we often are our own harshest critics. When we evaluate ourselves, we must remember and honor that light, that spark of the Divine, within each of us.

I believe the purpose of the High Holy Days is to renew our own awareness of this inner light, dust it off, and allow it to shine brightly for the New Year that is just beginning.

I hope your journey over the summer has been a restful and enjoyable one, restful, and that your journey into the New Year of 5772 is meaningful.

"U.S. Immigration and Naturalization"presented by Hal Bookbinder

One of the first things that the newly created United States of America did was to establish laws covering naturalization. These laws, however, were administered by the states with many variations. Over the years, the laws were repeatedly changed.

Finally, in 1906 the Federal Government took control of the entire process. The standardized documentation after 1906 has proven invaluable to genealogical researchers. Similarly, laws controlling immigration have also changed over time, generally becoming more restrictive. As immigration and naturalization documentation can be key information in tracing one's roots, understanding how the process worked over time, understanding how the information was recorded and where it might be found is essential.

This lecture will provide a short history of immigration and naturalization laws and provide general guidance in finding your ancestor's documentation.

This Month's Speaker:

Hal Bookbinder has been researching eight family lines for over 27 years, identifying 4,000 relatives and tracing two of these lines into the mid 1700s. A founding member of JGSCV, and former president of JGSLA and IAJGS, he created, and continues to edit the annual Jewish Genealogical Yearbook. In 2010, Hal received the IAJGS Lifetime Achievement Award

for his various contributions to Jewish Genealogy. Hal was recently elected to the JewishGen Board of Governors. He has spoken at numerous conferences, synagogues and society meetings on topics from computing to geography to brick walls.
