

Neuroscience and Remembering Our Past to Preserve Our Future

Like many others in our congregation, on Yom Hashoah, I lit a yellow candle and recited a prayer in remembrance of the genocidal murder of millions of Jews. Part of the prayer included the words, "May we recall their memory throughout the

year, so that they will not suffer a double death. May the memory of their lives inspire us to live meaningful Jewish lives so that we may help to insure that part of who they were shall always endure."

We've all heard that "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it" (George Santayana). In a different context, the latest neuroscience research helps us understand that we cannot have a meaningful future unless we remember our past.

Noted science writer Carl Zimmer tells of a young woman who was brought to the Tel Aviv Sourasky

Medical Center, sleepy and confused. Fani Andelman, a neuropsychologist, gave the woman a battery of psychological tests to judge her state of mind. At first the woman seemed fine. She could see and speak clearly. She could understand the meaning of words and recall the faces of famous people. She could even solve logic puzzles, including a complex test that required her to plan several steps ahead. But her memory had holes. She could still remember recent events outside her own life, and she could tell Andelman details of her life up to 2004. Beyond that point, however, her autobiography was in tatters. The more doctors probed her "episodic memory"—the sequential recollection of personal events from the past—the more upset she became. As for envisioning her personal future, that was a lost cause. Asked what she thought she might be doing anytime beyond the next day, she couldn't tell them anything at all.

The patient, Andelman realized, hadn't just lost her past; she had lost her future as well. It was impossible for her to imagine traveling forward in time. During her examination, the woman offered an explanation for her absence of foresight. "I barely know where I am," she said. "I don't picture myself in the future. I don't know what I'll do when I get home. You need a base to build the future."

I am struck by the stark message of this report. My take away is that in our individual desires to "just live life in the present" many of these efforts lack a certain, basic humanity. If we all lived merely in the present, then we wouldn't have a meaningful

> picture of the future, both individually and collectively. "It's like being in a room with nothing there and having a guy tell you to go find a chair," as one braininjured patient described his state of mind looking forward.

As Zimmer indicates, "The past and future may seem like different

worlds, yet the two are intimately intertwined in our minds."

As your Jewish community's home, Temple Ner Ami is committed to honoring our individual and collective pasts. Like all of our excellent staff and teachers, your Board of Directors works hard to provide our community crucial programs and support services, because without them, we quite literally would run the risk of having no future. They are indeed "a base to build the future." And together, our consciousness of past and future are critical to our success as a Jewish community today. I hope you consider this article, at least in part, as your renewed invitation to help. All you need to do right now is call, and ask me how.

Are We There Yet?

Take a plane flight, car ride, long walk or hike, and the inevitable question

at some point is, "Are we there yet?" or "How much farther-longer--when will we get there!?"

A plane flight I took a couple of years ago showed on the screens before us just exactly where the plane was, the altitude, speed, and approximate time left until landing.

We have something like this in Iewish life too.

We count exactly 50 days between Passover and Shavuot (the holiday commemorating when the Torah was given). The Israelites, only 50 days from Egypt, stood at the base of Mt. Sinai on Shavuot. We count these same 50 days today. To

make it simple, we begin counting the second day of Passover and count a "week of weeks" – 49 days. Thus we begin counting the Omer, the number of days until Shavuot. By the way, the Omer is a measure of barley, which was part of a festival offering about this time of year in ancient times when the Temple stood.

After the destruction of the Temple, we no longer brought this barley offering. So, a way eventually evolved that allows us to keep this previously agricultural 'counting of the Omer' relevant. A spiritual way to approach each of these 7 weeks between Passover and Shavuot includes treating this as an inner journey that we embark on individually. We take and examine in ourselves a different inner

character trait each week. For example, the basic journey for each of the weeks is as follows:

Week One: Love and Kindness

How do I manifest love and kindness in my life?

Week Two: Strength and Discipline

Am I using my strength in a balanced way? Do I have discipline in what I do?

Week Three: Beauty and Balance

Do I recognize the harmony and beauty in life? Where do I want more balance?

Week Four: Endurance

Do I have endurance, or too much endurance?

Week Five: Humility

Do I step into my role in life appropriately?

Week Six: Bonding

Do I use the above traits in a way that enable my bonding with others in my life?

Week Seven: Leadership, Belonging

Notice how unique and amazing you are. Are you taking those special qualities that you have in life and being a leader with them? Your contribution in life is unique to you. What actions would you like to take to manifest your contribution in the world? Validate the actions you have taken.

So, are we there yet? A pretty good question after all. When we count our days and weeks in such a manner we have the opportunity to not only count the days but make the days we do have count. May we be blessed and be a blessing. *Have fun counting!*



Membership Director's Report *Keith Elliott*

What does it mean to you to have a reform synagogue in our community?

I have written several times recently in the *MEGILLAH* about our collective commitment to, and personal responsibility toward Temple Ner Ami. We have endured a great deal of difficulty and stress over the last year, due to what really boils down to one thing. That thing is something that is extremely difficult to talk about openly, but it is no longer possible to be subtle or excessively polite about it-as a community, our collective commitment to Temple Ner Ami is not sufficient for TNA to survive.

This year, in spite of drastic cuts in virtually every part of the budget, many of which were extremely painful, we are going to run short of operating funds a full month before the end of the year (our financial year starts and ends on July 1st.) Things like payroll, rent, utilities...there will not be any money to pay those things. It is hard to see how any organization can continue to exist in those conditions.

It is a given that membership in a Temple is not a trivial expense in our lives. Last month I wrote about the sacrifices my own family is making just to pay our dues. What is important to realize is that if all members were able to commit fully to membership, our income would exceed our costs by a huge amount. Where the reality lies is that many of us, if not most of us, simply do not seem to put having a Temple in their community high enough on their personal priority list. Our actual collection of dues is roughly half of what the full dues amount would be.

We have a tendency to assume that certain things will always be there for us, whether we pay much attention or not. There will always be a fire department; if there is a budget crisis, they'll figure it out. There will always be police protection, or public libraries-they'll work it out; they'll never cut anything THAT important. If I get sick, there will always be a hospital there to take care of me. If I feel like attending a Shabbat service, the Temple will always be there. If I have a crisis in my life, it will be there.

It will not always be there. Hundreds of houses of worship closed their doors in 2011. This happens, and frequently. There is no one that will "work it out"; there is no "they". There is only US, the community that TNA serves. We OWN that Temple, and there is no way to avoid the responsibility that comes with that. Let me repeat that-the survival of TNA rests on the shoulders of the community. Not on the Board, not on the Clergy, not on the staff, not on the URJ or Jewish Federation. It's US. That's all there is.

I have tried to communicate this message in past articles with a friendly spin or feel; now I am being blunt. As a community, our collective commitment to Temple Ner Ami is not sufficient for TNA to survive. I hope and pray that all of us will re-examine our commitment to the existence of a Reform Temple in our community. We need to examine that quickly. We need to ask ourselves if that dues reduction reflects true financial need, or just a greater commitment to other things in our lives. We need to make good on the commitments we have already made. We need to finally realize that if we do not accept the responsibility for our survival, we will not survive.

Most importantly, we need to ask ourselves just how important it is to have a spiritual home in our community. A solution IS within view; the amountby whih we are falling short is one month in twelve. We CAN do this, and make sure there is a place for us to worship, to teach our children, and continue to show respect for our loved ones who have passed from us. That solution is for us to commit ourselves-each and every one of us-to making sure there will always be a Temple Ner Ami. To accept that there is no "they" to work it out, only US. Our people has survived millennia by taking our survival in our own hands, not by waiting for things to be worked out for us by someone else. And now, today, is the time to look at the survival of our community.

Dear Friends,

I wasn't going to write a column this month because frankly, I just ran out of time and couldn't meet the deadline. Mark Malloy is very generous every month with me-as I seem to get later and later in turning in my articles.

But something occurred on Wednesday in my personal life that made me want to pause and reflect-- and share some brief thoughts with you.

Many of you know that my son, Daniel, is a musician. A pianist. He has studied and worked and practiced and practiced since he was a little boy. His teacher, as a young child and through high school, was Peter Yazbeck.

In the music world, especially in the world of teaching, there are few who don't know Mr. Yazbeck. They have taken lessons from him, they have gone on to be fine musicians in their own right, they have become teachers and professors at universities.

Mr. Yazbeck died yesterday (April 18th). He was not a young man

and he had been ill for awhile but until the day of his death he continued to teach.

What Mr. Yazbeck was to our family is almost indescribable. The impact he had on our family's life is immeasurable. He opened an entire new world to us. He was our son's mentor, his guide, his advisor, his friend. It wasn't always easy—but Mr. Yazbeck was reassuring and patient. He was a great teacher and friend for me and for Saul.

Next month, on May 30th, the Torah School will have its end-of-year party. That is also Teacher Appreciation Day at the Temple—Yom ha Moreh.

Some of our teachers have only been with us for a year and others have worked with me for 16 years.






Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet by Jamie Ford

The book also cautions us to examine the present and to take heed that the United States doesn't repeat those injustices. (review from amazon.com)


