Some sixteen years ago I

first stood before the congregants of what was then called Jewish Families of Camarillo. I was being presented at the congregation's annual meeting as the new student rabbi. With a little bit of experience, a little bit of chutzpah, a lot of nerves and a lot of preparation, I tried to sound rabbinic. It was a disaster! It was then that I realized that I couldn't

pretend; that I just had to be myself.

How lucky I was to have a congregation who was so patient, so understanding and so willing to just let me be myself. When I describe the

experience, I often say "It's like a doctor who practiced medicine for a couple of years, liked it and then decided to go to medical school." So I practiced being a rabbi for two years, loved it and then decided to go on to rabbinical school. In my last year at Hebrew Union College, the congregation, now called Temple Ner Ami, again approached me. I served for a third year as student rabbi while in my last year at HUC, and for the next nine as an ordained rabbi.

I have laughed and cried with you, named your children, Bar and Bat Mitzvahed them, married them, named their children, and, sadly, laid some of them to rest along with our brothers, sisters, parents and grandparents. We have celebrated the holidays together, the serious and the silly. We have studied together and visited Israel together.

Words fail me as I try to express my gratitude and admiration to those who had the wisdom, courage and energy to begin this sacred congregation and who

sustained it with love. We have lost not a few of them as the years have passed yet I am confident that they continue to keep an eye on their Temple family from a much

higher vantage point. Their memory is truly a blessing.

And so now I wish you all and Temple
Ner Ami shalom. Shalom means far
more than goodbye. It comes from the
Hebrew root "shleymoot" which means
wholeness. I wish you and your new
rabbi, my dear friend and colleague Lisa
Bock, many years of wholeness, of health,
of learning, of prosperity, of friendship,
of community and of peace.

Cain y'he ratzon – may this be God's will.

Congratulations, Lisa!



The story of Baseball Hall-of-Famer Hank Greenberg, is told through archival film footage and interviews with Jewish and non-Jewish fans, his former teammates, his friends, and his family. 



The Temple Says Goodbye to Annelies Regen

By now we all have heard the sad news that our beloved Annelies Regen passed away on April 9th. The folllowing story on Annelies was written by Shari Brody for the May 2011 issue of the **MEGILLAH**:

Annelies was raised in Aachen, Germany during the events prior to World War II. As a child, she

recalls not being able to play with her best friend, swim in the public swimming area or go to the theater because she was Jewish . Annelies's mother was a friend of Anne Frank's grandmother, so Annelies and her sister, Susie, were playmates of the slightly younger Ann. From Aachen, Annelies and her family were able to walk on forest trails which crossed the borders in to Holland and Belgium.

When Annelies was thirteen, she was sent to a boarding school in Belgium. Just before



her sixteenth birthday, she was able to go to California, as there were fewer people waiting to come to the United States from Belgium than from Germany. She lived with her uncle and aunt in Los Angeles until her parents and sister could come a few years later and the family was reunited.

Annelies met Rudy Regen and they were married

in 1944. They enjoyed a 54 year marriage until his passing in 1997. She has a daughter, Nancy, who lives in Camarillo, and two granddaughters.

Before moving to Camarillo in 1992, Annelies worked at several banks and after two robberies, she left banking. Her next position was as an Office Manager in a private office where she worked for thirteen years until she retired. She has volunteered at the Jewish Home for the Aging as well as the Woman's

Care Cottage in North Hollywood. Annelies volunteers at our Temple on Fridays and has done so for the eleven months since our move. She has also been our Sisterhood Treasurer for years.

Annelies has had many interesting life experiences and is a charming and delightful woman to know! She plays Bridge, exercises and is Past President of ORT America where she had served eleven years as the group's President. Bravo, Annelies and many thanks for your many years of devotion and service to others!




Temple Ner Ami was started by five "founding mothers": Cindy Wolfsohn, Teli Milner, Lihi Gershater, Jeri Belzer, and Alyse Borla. The original goal was to provide a center for Jewish families to meet andshare their lives together. A Torah School and Center for Jewish learning was also put in place shortly afterwards. Thus, the name began as "IFC", "Iewish Families of Camarillo".

The first Board included these five women, and joined by Karen Roy, Joe Goldberg, Jay Crane, and Jack Snader. 2nd generation board members included Marvin Krantz, Lillian Hawthorne, and Fred Mesirov. Each Board member had a specific job to do to set JFC up and keep it running.

Teri and Cindy shared the jobs as Treasurerer and President. Jack - Ways and Means, Jeri Belzer acted as architect/designer, Alyse Borla was secretary, Lihi Gershater was the first book keeper. Lillian Hawthorne was the scholar in residence. Jay created the Ark and tables and eternal light for

Services which were held once a month. Services were led by Student Rabbi, Alison Flash with Julie Silver (now famous singer) acting as the first cantor. Marvin Krantz led the Ritual Committee (appropriate since his son was a Rabbi). He was joined by Irv Dubin - who had









an extensive knowledge of Jewish Rituals. Our library is names after Irv.

The move to the Calle Tesoro location happened within the first few years with Rabbi Latowicz, Student Rabbi Michael Lotker, and Jay Crane et al carrying the Torah to its new location. Rabbi Latowicz helped with school curriculum and Julia Newman began her tenure as Principal of the first school. Soon Jewish Families of Camarillo would transform into a Temple and would need a name.

Teri Milner was serving as President when Natalie Krantz recommented the perfect name for our Temple: Temple Ner Ami (A light of my people) The vote was 100% in favor and so TNA was born. Rabbi Kenneth Milhander was the Temple's first ordained Rabbi, serving as parttime Rabbi. Then Rabbi Michael Lotker came on Board, serving as parttime Rabbi for the ensuing ten years. Student Rabbi Lisa joined the staff in 2008 to share rabbinic duties, allowing Rabbi Mike time to

continue with his writing and lecture activities in the wider Jewish world. Rabbi Lisa will assume full time Rabbinic duties of TNA in July, with Rabbi Mike serving as Rabbi Emeritus.

What is Semicha?

I've heard in the hallways the question: What is *semicha?*

Semicha (smee-cha) is a Hebrew word literally meaning "laying on of hands," and refers to ordination. It is how a rabbi becomes a rabbi. Semicha comes from the Torah.

In Numbers, Moses is instructed to take Joshua and "lay his hands upon him," investing some of his authority in Joshua so that Joshua can lead the people in Moses' stead. The sages take this to mean that Moses bestowed ordination upon Joshua.

In the Rabbinic period, only those who had received ordination, passed down from Joshua and those after him, had the authority to be judges; and applied only to those who were scholars in Palestine. Those outside of Palestine who were otherwise qualified were given the title *rav*, meaning "master teacher." An ordained *rabbi* in Palestine was authorized to confer *semicha* on his own students. *Rabbi* literally means "my teacher."

Eventually though, in 425 CE, with Palestine under Roman rule, the ordination of rabbis was discontinued. It took until the 12th century for Moses Maimonides to suggest that with the full agreement of all the sages in Palestine, ordination could be restored. Though this did not truly come to pass in the formal way that Maimonides described, rabbis were ordained again, including Joseph Caro, the author of the Shulchan Arukh in Safed, a city in northern Palestine, in the 16th century. Over time, the practice of conferring *semicha* on individual students continued. It is in modern times that seminaries have come into existence, and they confer ordination on their students.

Ordination would not have been possible for me without the instruction, mentorship, and support of so many people in my life. As I become ordained this month, I have many to acknowledge and thank, but in particular, Rabbi Mike, my teacher, mentor, and friend. Thank you.





1998. A firebrand of a teacher came into my life. Miss Violet was our senior teacher in years and experience but certainly not in energy. She was the consummate early childhood teacher—old school. She used music, poetry, and art to teach 5 year olds the *alefbet* and prayers. The Shabbat service that her little ones led every May has been unsurpassed—as the children recited their poems and

blessings and sang the songs that she taught them—and the kids had a lilt of that British accent. In all the years she was with us, she never missed a day of school—even when in pain, walking with her cane (which she conveniently used to forget at home).

Violet did <u>not</u> teach countless students: we're a small school—but the children she taught—counted. She knew each child well. She knew their strengths and weaknesses. She talked to their parents—and became close with many of them.

On the occasion of her 90th birthday, we surprised Violet by painting her classroom a bright purple! Violet used to promise that she would not retire until she was 100 years old or I retired.

Annie meant a lot to us at the Torah School. Every year, for many years, she would speak to our 7th graders in their Holocaust Education class. She would tell the kids about her life as a little girl; how she and her sister Suzy knew Anne Frank. She made Anne Frank, the real girl, come alive for us not just a figure in a book or an icon that everyone

> in the world knows about; but a real child, who sometimes wasn't nice, who was ordinary, just like all those other children. The kids were able to connect with Annie's stories—not like something they were reading in a history book that wasn't connected to real people. Annie was living history sitting right in their classroom. That was her gift to our students.

To both of these grand ladies they will forever be a part of our Torah School.






Yahrzeit Board
