God-Wrestling

A number of weeks ago, discussing the Torah portion Vayikra, I wrote the following:

As a youngster, I was fortunate to have horses, and I would get all my afterschool chores done as fast as I

could so that I could spend as much time as possible riding my horses. I think that just might be where I got to think about nature, about life, and about God.

I often thought that God was watching me, and as I rode, I would talk to God and share my thoughts and concerns. At the time, God seemed to me to be like a kindly grandfather who would listen to me and give me advice.


Later on, though, perhaps around



influenced by the strides women were making in equal rights, pay, and so forth, I began to re-think this image. Perhaps God wasn't really grandfatherly, perhaps grandmotherly, or perhaps, as I thought later,

beyond anything I could imagine, and certainly beyond any human form.

In this week's Torah portion Vayikra (meaning God called), God is giving instructions to Moses that Moses is to relate to the people, about bringing offerings to the Tent of Meeting. In this first chapter in the book of Leviticus,



there is a phrase noting that one of these offerings will be turned to smoke on the altar, a "gift of pleasing odor to the Lord."

A pleasing odor to the Lord?

Does God appreciate the smell of a burnt offering?

The text in our Torah certainly makes it sound like God has a nose and olfactory senses...are we to take this seriously? Seriously, yes. Literally, perhaps not.

You see, our great commentators, including Rashi and Ibn Ezra, and others, considered this as well.

The idea that God actually smells the aroma of a burnt

offering is completely rejected by our Sages. One of our major commentators, Rashi, says that what is pleasing to God is

that Israel is doing God's instructions and making



sacrifices, not that God appreciates the smell of the burnt offerings.

One of the important things I think we can take from this is the notion that our idea of God is something that changes as we grow, and that our sages and scholars have also wrestled with their own ideas of God. This gives us the opportunity to question and explore the question of what is God for ourselves. I have noticed that we may come to some idea at one point in life only to find it changing later. We grow and change and mature, and I have a sense that our ideas and questions do too. What is God to you? How and where do you find God?

This spurred conversation with several people, and I found myself not only talking about the views expressed above, but also recommending the book, "Finding God," by Rifat Sonsino and Daniel B. Syme.

Requests then followed, asking for a class on the Jewish Views of God, and what they are. In answer to that request, I will be leading a 7 session Adult Education Series in May and June, based on the views presented in "Finding God," Sonsino and Syme's book.

I am really excited about this – whether you are interested in great Jewish thinkers, perhaps you are a confirmed atheist, or perhaps you are interested in the question of whether Jewish views of God have been influenced by life, time, and the Holocaust, then this series is for you. This series is titled, "God-Wrestling," as we are the Children of Israel, and Israel means, to "wrestle with God."

Where do you find God? Do you wrestle with God? Come join us - this will be a fascinating series!

Yom Hashoah Day of Remembrance

Shalom, As I complete my tenure

as the Educator of Temple Ner Ami, I think back on all of the good things we have done. I take tremendous pride in everything our little school has accomplished, but along the way there have been some highlights that are especially meaningful to me. One of those is our most recent Yom Hashoah Day of Remembrance.

It is the tradition at Ner Ami that our students have a Mitzvah project; that they perform a good deed that enhances the meaning and relevance of their Bar or Bat Mitzvah. These projects generally take the form of community service—tikkun olam healing the world.

Last Fall Rabbi Lisa and I talked about the idea of our students having a class project—interviews of our community's Holocaust survivors and liberators. We presented the idea to the teachers, students and parents and all agreed that it would be very worthwhile for the students, the survivors, their families and the community-atlarge.

On Sunday, April 7 to a standingroom-only audience we showed a film which was a compilation of those interviews. Many of the people had already been filmed by the Shoah foundation, had created their own documentaries and had given public lectures in schools, synagogues and churches. What we felt was different about this experience was the very personal and intimate nature of a young person sitting down with a senior and finding out about their life. Truthfully, this will likely be the last generation that will have the opportu-

nity to meet and speak personally to a Holocaust survivor.

> All of those interviewed talked about their lives after coming to the United States. They all had done something to serve our Country and humanity. They had lectured to numerous organizations about their experiences, including military posts, schools, and organizations serving the homeless. Several served in our Armed Forces shortly after their arrival in the





United States, providing translating and code-breaking expertise. One of them became a Nazi-Hunter and was responsible for the arrest of several Nazi war criminals. Some had strong ties to Israel.

What we found across-the-board was that all of those interviewed were articulate, smart and inspirational. What was especially interesting was the remarkable memory, attention to details and dates. Although this is not surprising, considering the experiences all had gone through—it still was a fascinating phenomenon of the interview experience.

The credits at the end of the film showed that it was produced and

directed by me and Saul Lessler, one of our 7th grade teachers and also my husband. I jokingly, but honestly commented that prior to this project the only thing that Saul and I had produced and sometimes successfully directed is our son, Daniel.

At the program I wanted everyone to know this because without the assistance of Ken Bahr—who helped us to edit and added music and photos—it would not be the film that it now is. Saul and I painfully learned that some of the best work was left on the cutting room floor. We had taken nearly 9 hours of video and condensed it to an hour and 20 minutes. However, copies of the full interviews will be available in the libraries of Temple Ner Ami Library, Temple Beth Torah Library and the Jewish Federation.

As a result of this experience, we have decided to continue the project—with the hope of interviewing and chronicling additional survivors and liberators of Ventura County.

We are truly grateful for the stories that these people shared with us and we are humbled by their service that they have rendered to the world.

We will never forget them. We will never forget what they have taught us.



Motivated by personal experiences with loss, Terry Kaldhusdal and Mike Bernhagen produced a powerful and inspiring documentary film that examines how 21st century Americans live at the end of their lives. Most of us have gotten away from openness about end of life decisions.

"Consider the Conversation" reminds us that thinking and talking about life's final chapter well in advance can help prevent unnecessary physical, emotional, spiritual, and social suffering, that is, to help avoid regrets.

This program, "Consider the Conversation", goes beyond the issue of whether a person has an Advance Directive. (That, of course is fundamental and important.) This documentary invites people to start to talk about the natural, sometimes difficult, and, of course, emotional event called end of life.

This documentary shows people who are looking at questions like:

- Are there things you want to say to one another while you can talk and hear?
- Does everyone know and understand the wishes of the person who may be dying?
- Who gets to make the important decisions at this time: the physician, the family or the person whose life it is?
- Is it okay, even if very emotional, to put into words that the person is dying (and we're saying goodbye)?

After the documentary, we will have an opportunity to talk with Dr. Lanyard **Dial**, Livingston Memorial Visiting Nurse Association and Hospice President/CEO & the Medical Director. Dr. Dial is so wonderfully down to earth. Also it's great that the temple and the church are joining together to provide this important program to the community. This program may also be a "gift," a reminder, to the people who see it of doing something so important for you and your family.

CONSIDER THE CONVERSATION: A Documentary on a Taboo Subject



with loss, Terry Kaldhusdal and Mike Bernhagen produced a powerful and inspiring documentary film that examines how 21st century Americans live at the end of their lives. 
THE 'BREW CREW

Member Spotlight – Libby Pierce

One could say that a person's legacy is carried on through the family and friends who keep the memories alive. In many ways that is what Libby Pierce feels she is doing for her recently departed husband. Holocaust survivor Charles Pierce. It is admirable that for 58 years Libby was by Charles' side not only as his wife but as an advocate speaker of the Holocaust to more than 4000 students per year.

People don't always realize that in addition to doing such admirable work to support her husband, Libby herself is known for admirable work, and it is with great pleasure that I share her story.

Libby grew up in New York. At the age of 8, she was already playing Mah Jongg. After graduating high school in Brooklyn, she went to work for an insurance broker. She was set up on a blind date and three weeks later, her blind date turned out to be the love of her life. Charles proposed marriage just three weeks after they met and they were married six months to the day after that. Libby worked for the insurance broker until her first child was born and then she became a stay at home mother,

After heading west and settling in Camarillo, Libby also served as the President of the Camarillo section of National Council of Jewish Women until it was disbanded. She has been a tutor for more than 25 years and still keeps in touch with a few of the kids she once mentored.

For the past 19 years, Libby has played piano for the Camarillo Health Center. Nowadays you can find her playing a game of Pan and Maj Jongg or even tickling the ivories in front of the board meeting at Leisure Village. She continues to tutor in El Descanso Elementary School on Monday & Wednesdays and her continued volunteer work doesn't end just yet - on Fridays, you can find her assisting Mark Malloy in the Temple Ner Ami office.

Please wear your badge during services and at any temple event – this is a great way to finally discover the name of the person whose face






