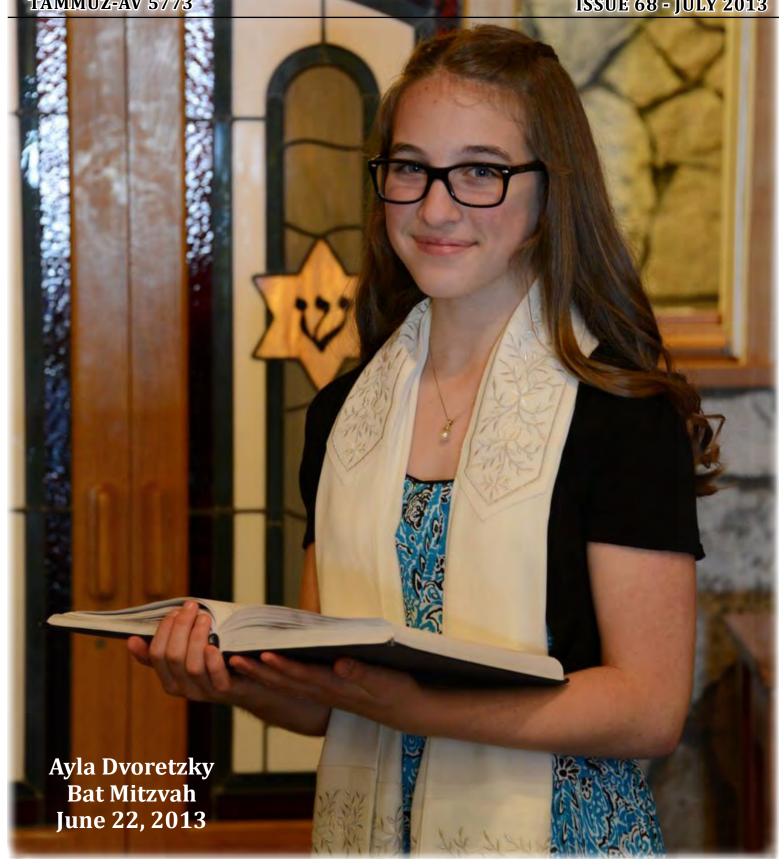

The Art of Welcoming: Friendship

Friendship is man's greatest gift. – Moses Ibn Ezra

Have you ever had the experience of walking into a community, a gym, a golf or tennis club, or even a class for the first time? (Of course – we all have!) How did it feel? Did you feel right at home immediately? Probably not.

I remember the first time I joined a gym. Interested in their hip hop class, I finally went because a friend invited me. I had no idea how to do hip hop, and I was a bit scared - I did not even know what to wear. I walked in and felt out of place, awkward, and I was sure everyone knew I was new. But when I saw my friend, I felt a huge sense of relief. Suddenly I had my guide, a bit of reassurance, and my comfort level rose. I went again, and then again. I made friends in the hip-hop class, and pretty soon I joined the gym. After a while, I even started to take other classes. I no longer felt like a stranger – the gym had become **my gvm**. But it was that first invitation, that first class, standing next to my friend, who helped me to know where to stand, what to expect, and what to do, that made it possible in the first place.

Belonging to a temple can be a similar experience. You might remember how strange it felt to walk into a new synagogue and wonder if you would know anyone, or at least meet someone nice – will the melodies be the same, will someone say "Shabbat Shalom," will you leave feeling like it mattered that you were there?

Imagine how many people who might never get that first invite from a friend or be greeted at temple events, including Shabbat - who would make them feel at home, look forward to seeing them, knows what to do, and then meet new people, and mingle at the oneg afterwards?

Now imagine how wonderful it would feel to make or receive a call to get together for dinner and go to services on Shabbat. Imagine walking in and seeing people you know, people who are looking forward to seeing you, developing friendships, and being Jewish together.

Torah can be acquired only through friendship. – Talmud, Berakhot 63b

In the Talmud it says Torah is acquired only through friendship. When we study, we do not study alone – we study either as a group or in chevruta – pairs. It is through the interaction with others, that true learning takes place.

When we pray, when we get together to say Kaddish, we require ten Jewish adults. Pirke Avot teaches us that when ten Jews get together to study Torah, the Divine Presence is in their midst. It is really not possible for a Jew to be fully Jewish alone, without community. We need each other, we need friendship, and we need community. You are needed. Your presence and friendship is needed.

Friendship is like a treasury: you cannot take from it more than you put into it.

We are Jews, and we are instructed in the Torah to "love the stranger, as you were once strangers in the land of Egypt." (Deuteronomy 10:19). We must first remember what it is like to be the stranger, and then like Abraham, we must rush to the stranger in our midst and welcome them.

In Mussar, Jewish Ethics, one of the character traits we study is generosity. It is an act of giving, of generosity, when we welcome others, when we give our selves in friendship. I believe generosity is one of the character traits that lies at the heart of Jewish community.

We can show our own generosity and practice the *Art of Welcoming* when we:

- 1. Invite a friend to temple services and events, and perhaps even have them over for a meal. All it takes is a phone call, and your caring.
- 2. Say hello to the person sitting next to you at services, ask their name, join them at the oneg.
- 3. Take a class (or even ask for a class you'd like to take). Invite a friend to take a class with you! This is one of the best ways to get to know people!

- 4. Participate in synagogue events- and yes, invite a friend!
- 5. Speak to people you do not know at the Shabbat Oneg, introduce yourself, and ask their name.
- 6. Join a havurah one way to develop lifelong friendships is to join a havurah. A havurah is a group of temple members with common interests who get together outside of temple and together may travel, dine, go to theatre, study, and many other fun activities.
- 7. Get involved with the Sisterhood or other groups and even committees that are an integral part of temple life.
- 8. Call or visit a friend from temple when you haven't seen them in a while. Let them know you miss them.
- 9. Let the temple office know if you or a friend is ill, so your clergy and temple community may offer additional support and caring.
- 10. Volunteer to help set up at an oneg, bring bagels to Torah study Saturday mornings at 9:00 am, or help at a temple event or perhaps in the office. Yes, this is generous and welcoming!
- 11. Join us for Torah study offered on Shabbat mornings at 9:00, and Wednesdays at noon. Adult education classes are regularly offered at 7:00 pm on Tuesday evenings. There are so many opportunities to learn and participate check the Ner Ami calendar!
- 12. This list of welcoming ideas is just a start I am sure you can think of many more. Better yet, act on them!

These are just a few ideas that when we carry them out, make our temple a warm, welcoming, active and vibrant place to be!

group of young people who also "wake up my inspiration": the Tzofim, the Israeli Scouts.

Gratefulness May Enhance Health

Gratitude is an attitude of being thankful or appreciative for what we have instead of focusing or feeling bad about what we do not have. Ancient scriptures teach us that gratitude can benefit our health. Is it possible that ancient wisdom seekers were right about an attitude of gratitude having a positive effect on health?

According to a study done by Robert Emmons of UC Davis, people who routinely practice gratitude generally experience better health. The study shows that this

may be because grateful people tend to take better care of themselves by eating a healthy diet, engaging in regular exercise, and having regular physicals. Additionally, grateful people seem to handle the stresses of life better which can lead to healthier immune systems.

Often stress brings about negative, sad, and angry feelings that can be self-perpetuating, resulting in depression and a

decline in self-care, such as poor diet, lack of exercise and changes in sleep patterns. Research shows that poor diet, lack of exercise, and constant stress are part of a continuum of chronic diseases, such as diabetes and heart disease.

Interestingly, some stress is good for us and helps us strive to live productive lives and to adapt to the changes life hands us. However, continual unremitting stress creates inflammation of the tissues and depresses the immune system. The human body was designed to respond to danger by activating the fight-flight stress response by producing cortisol and adrenaline which help the heart beat faster, help the lungs breathe faster, the liver to produce more sugar and the muscles to become tighter, all of which are needed for running or fighting. However, chronic and relentless stress causes

continual and chronic elevation of cortisol and adrenaline, which negatively impacts the body through persistent wear on the heart, tension on the muscles and blood vessels, and overproduction of glucagon. Also, perpetual production of cortisol decreases the number of active T-cells and shrinks the thymus gland, allowing for reduced immunity.

On the other hand, studies show that when stress is controlled through emitting positive feelings, the

> immune system is enhanced through stimulation of Natural Killer Cells which fight pathogenic intruders. The NK cells are stimulated by interleukins which have been shown to be positively affected by feelings of excitement, happiness, exercising, satisfaction and bliss.

> So, what we think and feel can have an impact on our health. When the mind-body balance is poor, our immune response becomes dysfunctional allowing for inflammation of tissues, wear on body,

and a general run-down aspect physically, mentally and emotionally, which can lead to chronic and agerelated diseases. But there is hope and help in the simple method of practicing gratitude on a daily basis as per Emmon's study which showed that daily journaling about five things you are grateful for helps with optimism and a general feeling of wellbeing, as well as improved sleep. Suggestions for the journey of gratitude toward health include, but are not limited to:

- Keep a daily gratitude journal
- Tell your friends and others that you are grateful to them
- See adversity as an opportunity to learn and
- Change from negative to positive thoughts

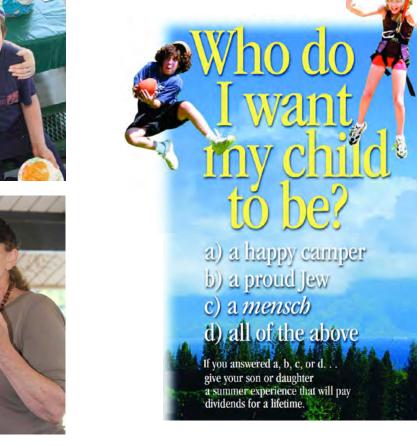

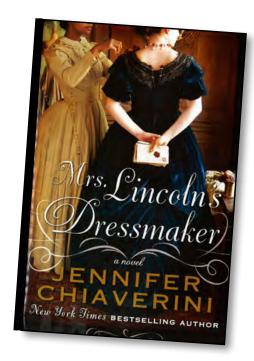

July Book: Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker

New York Times bestselling author Jennifer Chiaverini illuminates the extraordinary friendship between Mary Todd Lincoln and Elizabeth Hobbs Keckley, a former slave who won her freedom by the skill of her needle, and the friendship of the First Lady by her devotion. In Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker, novelist Jennifer Chiaverini presents a stunning account of the friendship that blossomed between Mary Todd Lincoln and her seamstress, Elizabeth "Lizzie" Keckley, a former slave who gained her professional reputation in Washington, D.C. by outfitting the city's elite. Keckley made history by sewing for First Lady Mary Todd Lincoln within the White House, a trusted witness to many private moments between the President and his wife, two of the most compelling figures in American history.

Keckley saved scraps from the dozens of gowns she made for Mrs. Lincoln, eventually piecing together a tribute known as the Mary Todd Lincoln Quilt. She also saved memories, which she fashioned into a book, Behind the Scenes: Thirty Years a Slave and Four Years in the White House. Upon its publication, Keckley's memoir created a scandal that compelled Mary Todd Lincoln to sever all ties with her, but in the decades since, Keckley's story has languished in the archives. EVERY DAY IS A NEW BEGINNING

daughter, two cats and dog. Many friends and

family members called us to "check in" and offer love and support and a place to stay.

When I reflect on the overwhelming

experience, I believe that the support and generous offerings of the people we love got me through the feelings of loss and devastation.

Because of this recent experience I believe I will be a stronger leader of our new loss support group. Please come and join this group. and learn to share your personal

experiences, helping yourself and others.



So-Cal Edison Medical Baseline Program

to receive additional baseline allocation. Certification by a doctor is required.

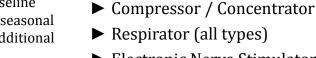
Medical Baseline program offers an additional year-round baseline allocation of 16.5 kWh per day in addition to your applicable seasonal baseline and the baseline for your region. You can apply for additional kWh if you have a hardship case and need more.

To be eligible for Medical Baseline, you or someone who lives with you full-time must require use of a medical life-support device or piece of equipment. Life support devices utilize mechanical or arti-

ficial means to sustain, restore or replace a vital function.

You or a full-time resident can also be a paraplegic, hemiplegic, quadriplegic, multiple sclerosis or scleraderma patient, or have a life-threatening illness or compromised immune system.
