Ever Notice?

Ever go out for an evening walk, or drive home, and notice that the moon is full?

Just the other

day, I took my dog for an evening walk, and saw a beautiful, full moon.

Our Jewish calendar is connected to the cycles of the moon. Whenever you see a full moon, check the Jewish calendar. You'll usu-

ally see that it is the 14th or 15th of the Hebrew month.

And, this is usually when we have festivals - some sort of gathering that we do as Jews. It makes so much sense. Imagine ancient times – no phone, no text, no reminder emails. But, everyone knows when there's a full moon - and we get together at the full moon in the Fall, and

again in the Spring, as well as one in the middle of winter.

These dates this year include:

Sukkot (first day): 15 Tishri - September 19th

Tu B'Shevat (New Year for the Trees): 15 Shevat - January 16th

Passover: 15 Nisan – April 15th (note, the 1st seder is Monday evening, April 14th)

Shavuot: 6 Sivan – June 4th (calculated as the 50th day after Passover)

The months of the Hebrew calendar are determined by the recurring phases of the moon: the new month, Rosh Chodesh, begins when the new moon appears, and is thus the first

day of each Hebrew month. From the earliest times, the lunar month was far more than a measuring device for Jews. The cycles of Hama-or Hakatan, "the lesser light" (Genesis 1:16), served as a reminder of God's work of creation, and led naturally to the celebration of the new moon as an important festival in Biblical times. The major festivals, with the exception of Shabbat, in turn, were dated

by the new moon's occurrence.

service on the day of Rosh Chodesh.

The one unusual feature of Rosh Chodesh is that, while it remained an ordinary workday for men, an ancient tradition declares it a women's holiday. Jewish women were to refrain from all work, or at least heavy work, on that day. According to legend, God rewarded them with a special day of rest for refusing to join in with the Israelite men in the sin of the Golden Calf. Today, many Jewish

from/around the New Moon include: Rosh Hashanah: 1 Tishri - September 4th (in 2013)

Chanukah: 25 Kislev-1 Tevet – Nov 28th-Dec 4th (in 2013)

The Mishnah describes in detail the procedure by which the new month was fixed in the days before the destruction of the Temple. That, combined with the development of a scientifically calculated calendar in the Talmudic period, served to diminish the significance of Rosh Chodesh, reducing it to a minor festival. Its observance today is generally limited to its proclamation in certain synagogues on the preceding Shabbat and to some liturgical changes in the

Like Drew Barrymore in the movie **50 First Dates**, I never know what I am going to write about each month. Some times

I am inspired by recent events in my life, the lives of persons I know, political events, or religious aspects of life (the High Holy Days, bar mitzvahs). This month I wanted to write about a disturbing yet profound experience I just had.

When I am not doing President of the TNA Board stuff, I am a Developmental Psychologist, the clinical director of a regional center (serving thousands of persons with developmental disabilities such as intellectual disability, autism, or cerebral palsy). We got a call last week from a hospital, when I learned that someone we support had suffered a series of terrible

medical events (including a heart stoppage) that had left the patient on life support, brain dead and dying, with no chance of regaining consciousness or walking out of the ICU. He had days to live before his body would shut down completely. The patient (let me call him "Mr.John Doe") had

no family alive that could give consent for medical treatment, so the hospital's bioethics committee in consultation with Mr. Doe's physician felt that a Do Not Resuscitate order was in order, and that withdrawal of life support was indicated. With no one left alive in Mr. Doe's family, there was no one to be with him except strangers at this final moment.

The chief social worker on my team, "Elliot", had known Mr. Doe for many years. He asked that the hospital please not withdraw support until he could be there and sit with Mr. Doe, so that John would not be alone at this final and overwhelming moment. The hospital agreed, and as my teammate got up to go to Mr. Doe's bedside to be with him, I felt the need to go with him. Not to support John, as I did not know him, but to support Elliot. I knew that he would often go over and above his duties when it came to the more human side of things. Elliot would take on the suffering of others, and would place himself into painful situations if he thought it would help ease the pain of others less fortunate than himself.

As the physicians and nurses gently turned off various switches and eased Mr. Doe's passing, Elliot held John's hand and gently talked to him, speaking softly to ease any fear should Mr. Doe have any chance of understanding what was happening. [This was extremely unlikely, given Mr. Doe's brain death the previous day]. I was struck by the absolute gravitas of the moment. I thought of my father's passing at his home in the company of my mother and sister. No tubes or machines, no nurses, not strangers but a quiet final moment with loving family. Such a contrast to the passing of Mr. Doe, who would have died surrounded

by strangers but for the grace of God, in the form of a social worker who could not abide the thought of a ...as my teammate got up to man he knew being disconnected from Life alone.

> At Rosh HaShana one of the TNA Board members said to me "we have no idea who the Messiah will be, what he or she will look

like." What my coworker did was God's will, of that I am sure. He was there to offer comfort, ease fear, give lovingkindness to the stranger. Something that any of us can do, yet many of us do not realize that we can. Are we too afraid, too ignorant of the moment? So hard to know, and I am not sure what the answer is to the question "what can I do to be [part of] a holy people?" But if I can emulate my friend Elliot, and be present, be there in the moment for others, those I love as well as those I don't, perhaps I can start to answer that question. As we have observed these High Holy Days together in prayer, it was never my expectation that along with the various HHD services a very holy moment of my life was going to occur in an ICU. I'd like to thank you, the members of Temple Ner Ami, because you are giving me a chance to be there for strangers as well as those I love. May this new year be a sweet one for you.

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with her beautiful voice that she had written especially for Julia.

The service was concluded and there were some words from Arla Crane about the lovely Oneg that was awaiting us and about the most beautiful cake designed for Julia by Bev Kerwien. A final surprise was the appearance of Rabbi Michael Lotker who had written a song to a familiar tune for Julia. The entire audience laughed and enjoyed Rabbi Lotker's creative work as he sang to Julia.

Finally, dessert!!! Everyone loved the cake baked by Bev. And although it was a large sheet cake, it was gone in a short time.




Shalom All,
