You Noticed. by Steve Graff, President

Often people say "in the black" for flush times; "in the red" for times of financial struggle. We're reversing that for this **MEGILLAH**. Color ink is more expensive than black and white to print. So from now on the Megillah will be in black and white. Plus we're going to make it a leaner publication. Large documents need more paper and cost more in postage, and they take more time to lay out for publication.

So, starting in January, the Board of Directors is considering sending the *MEGILLAH* to you *only via E-mail* and posted on line at our temple website. So read your E-Mail; look at our website. Temple Ner Ami may not be mailing you the *MEGILLAH* anymore. If you need a printed copy because you do NOT have E-Mail, we will still print B/W copies and perhaps mail them, deliver them to you, or make them available at the temple for you to pick up. But if you have a valid E-mail address we are seriously considering not printing it, and instead, E- mailing it to you. So do open the *MEGILLAH* E-mail or read it online at our website, so you know what is going on at the temple! This action (still under consideration-there are pros and cons both fiscally and communicatively) will happen if we determine that it will save the temple significant money. We need to cut some costs as economic times are tough. **Oy Vegas** was a wonderful event, and fundraiser, and we still need to do more.

The temple is going to be open fewer hours during the week. We will be "dark" on Mondays and will not have a full day on Fridays. This means the office will be closed at those times, and no staff will be available to talk with people who drop by or call the office. You can still call and leave messages. There is good news as well. We've hired a part-time bookkeeper so our accounts receivable and membership financials will be more timely.

We will be scheduling a Temple-wide meeting to talk about these changes in coming weeks. We want to know what you think; we encourage you to be part of the solution to these problems we face. Meeting only once a year to discuss the temple's business as a congregation isn't enough. Please come to that meeting. Further details will be forthcoming.





A few weeks ago I had the pleasure of listening to women speaking about their respective religions. I was one of the speakers as well. Upon hearing each of their descriptions, I was impressed with not only who these amazing women are,

but also at their description of clearly defined expectations and beliefs that their respective religions require.

Hmm. If someone asked you,

"What does Judaism require of you?", what would your answer be?

As liberal Jews, our answer may just take some effort to formulate. You see, we don't have a particular dogma. We might answer, we believe in God, we're supposed to circumcise our sons on the eighth day, we're supposed to have a Bar or Bat Mitzvah at age 13, we're supposed to go to synagogue on the High Holy Days, and fast on Yom Kippur. And so on.

So what is a good answer to this - that is, as liberal Jews, how do we answer this question?

A Question

One, we believe in God, and, we also struggle with God. We may struggle with just what God is, whether God is, as we do know that God is intangible, and that leaves us with a whole lot of questions. Our search for God is beautifully illustrated in the book, "Finding God" by Soncino and Syme, and is a book that has been studied more than once at Ner Ami!



Two, we are made "b'tzelem Elohim," in the image of God (though we don't quite know what that is!). What we can make of this is that human life is precious, we are each God's children, as a matter of fact, one of the highest values in Jewish life is the saving of a life.

Jewish People. Jews may be "born into the 'tribe'," and they may also convert to Judaism. At some level, though, we all, today, choose to be Jewish.

Fourth, as Jews, we are connected to other Jews here and around the world. We may speak different languages, even look different, but we are Jews and we are connected.

But so far, does that really answer: What does Judaism require of us?

There are some answers to this question, Jewish answers.

But rather than list them here,

I'd rather begin a discussion, I'd rather hear what you think.

Let me know what your answer is - by email (I'm at rabbi@ templenerami.org), in person at Torah study (Saturdays at 9 am, TNA Library, and Wednesdays at noon), on Shabbat, and even in the hall at Temple.

In our next Megillah, I'll put some of your answers.



A DAY OF DIVERSITY

On October 27th at the Camarillo Boys & Girls Club approximately 230 attendees were treated to a music festival celebrating cultural diversity and the legacy of Daniel Pearl, the Wall Street Journal reporter who was assassinated by the Taliban in Pakistan.

The breadth of music ranged from Klezmer to Gospel. There were Mariachis, Taiko Drummers, beautiful songs by the cantor for the Temple of the Arts, a Mendelssohn sonata for clarinet and piano, a haunting Nigun by clarinet, and the first movement of a dramatic Schubert sonata.

The artists donated their time and talent to make the festival a day that will be remembered by all who attended. They were, in order of appearance: the Ventura Klezmer Band, Togen Daiko Drummers, Ilysia Pierce, David Singer, Daniel Newman Lessler, Greater Hope Gospel Band and Mariachi Costa de Oro. Also donating their time behind the scenes were Bill Locker, Julie Pope, Jeff Foss, Dennis Beck, Mark Malloy and Moises Mercado. proved that music has the power to communicate with people and celebrate their diversity.

We can each start with small actions that take just a moment's effort. Help your neighbor, reach out to the burdened mother, offer help to a bewildered stranger, offer assistance to anyone who may be struggling."

13th. She gave those grieving the comfort that God is with them and shelters and protects them through this difficult time.


We welcome new members to our support group. There is a sense of caring and peace in



Tom Sherbourne is a lighthouse keeper on Janus Rock, a tiny island a half day's boat journey from the coast of Western Australia. When a baby washes up in a rowboat, he and his young wife Isabel decide to raise the child as their own. The baby seems like a gift from God, and the couple's reasoning for keeping her seduces the reader into entering the waters of treacherous morality even as Tom--whose moral code withstood the horrors of World War I-begins to waver. M. L. Stedman's vivid characters and gorgeous descriptions of the solitude of Janus Rock and of the unpredictable Australian frontier create a perfect backdrop for the tale of longing, loss, and the overwhelming love for a child that is The Light Between Oceans.



Religion: From the Perspective of Women-AAUW Oaktwig Dec 2013

The November 6 branch program was part of AAUW's educational mission about women and what affects them. Jeanette Hosek was the moderator for the packed house of 75. Handouts were available for many of the religions along with a helpful sheet on *Ground Rules for Dialogue* between people with differing views.

Hosek cited the PEW Research Center study that found that 83% of the U.S. population is affiliated with or connected to a religion and 51% of those are women. Only 16% of the U.S. population is not affiliated with a particular religion. And worldwide 8 in 10 identify with a religious group. Six major religions - Jewish (Rabbi Lisa Bock), Muslim, (Nooshie Motaref), Unitarian-Universalist (Rev. Betty Stapleford), Christian/Catholic (Barbara Durand), Hindu (Nitika

Parmar) and Buddhist (Lily Sugino) were represented at this program.

In the first segment, each woman was given ten minutes to speak about her religion. All had a devotion to their religious preference - and many a sense of humor about certain aspects. For the audience there was an opportunity for enlightenment when stereotypes were either dispelled or placed in context of the historical development of that religion.

The women then discussed the various roles women play in their religion. Barbara Durand spoke of the historical role of nuns in the Catholic faith: Rabbi Bock commented that historically woman have been an important part of Judaism; Nooshie Motaref mentioned that many of the customs regarding women were part of the middle east prior to the ar-

rival of Mohammed; Betty Stapleford listed many famous American women e.g. Susan B. Anthony who were Unitarians and also that over half of all current clergy are female. All were concerned about a woman's direct involvement in each religion and how it was evolving.

It seems most religions have a common thread perhaps beginning with a cultural overtone, connecting members to community and bringing members to a belief, or respect and a love of God while teaching the importance of conducting an ethical/ moral life. One might wonder why AAUWTO chose this program but seeing women from many different religions sitting shoulder to shoulder in the audience demonstrated the power of women to accept differences and create community.

Fall Prevention Safety for the Elderly

Living a safe, healthy, and independent life is important for older adults. Falls, however, rob them of this life. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 1 in 3 adults age 65 years and older fall every year. These falls result in moderate to severe injuries, which include: hip fractures, lacerations, and head traumas. Increased age, lack of exercise, and a poor diet are personal risk factors for falling. Medical conditions that contribute to falls include, but are not limited to: side effects of medications, impaired musculoskeletal function, arthritis, and vision and/or hearing loss. Falls are easily prevented. The following are proven interventions that can decrease falls and help older adults live better, and longer.

Fall Prevention Safety for the Elderly:

- Exercise regularly- Improves leg strength and balance
- Review medications, both over-the-counter and prescription, with your physician or pharmacist. Medications may cause side effects (e.g., dizziness, drowsiness) and use of multiple medications may result in drug interactions.
- Annual vision checks
- Home modifications- improving lighting in the home, add grab bars in the shower, add railing on both sides of stairways, and remove any tripping hazards (e.g., wire or cords, clutter on the floor, loose or torn carpet)
- Wear well-fitting shoes. Avoid going barefoot or wearing slippers.
